

far as to be put on trial and executed in order to get his inconvenient ways out of the way.

For all that we have going on in our lives, the Christian witness cannot succumb to the notion of inconvenience. Easter, and the events that we mark during Holy Week, which lead up to that grand mystery of the Resurrection, remind us that God is not the inconvenience; the other stuff is. To know that God expresses God's love in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus is the true life-giving gift of life that feeds us through our own journey of life.

Part of the gift of being among the baptized who are grafted into the body of Christ, into the grace-filled relationship with Jesus, who fully reveals God's love to us, is the perspective to know what is important in our lives. The world may say cars, electronics, wealth, fame, status are what make you who you are. The inconvenience of Easter speaks otherwise. Easter says for us to know we are loved and claimed by God, and we do not lose that. In the challenges and losses of life and relationships, God's love is with you. To care and serve one another is a gift which reflects the love Jesus shows us. The celebrations and events we celebrate in our lives come from the life God gives to us.

Easter reminds us not to confuse what gives life with the stuff that goes on in life. It may be tempting to skip the inconvenience of Easter and focus on the busy stuff. The Easter challenge for the Christian today may be to resist the temptation and join in the great mystery of new life our Lord gives in the Easter event.

From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

As our Lenten journey nears an end and we look forward to celebrating the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ at the Easter Vigil, I am reminded of an article I read before Ash Wednesday. In it, the author spoke of how many Christians give up things like certain foods or behaviors during Lent and that a few years ago he gave up giving those things up; he gave up Lent. He went on to write that those things which the church calls us to during Lent: self-examination, repentance, prayer, fasting, and self-denial, reading and meditating on God's holy Word, are things that we should be practicing year-round.

The spiritual practices we are called to during the season of Lent are foundational blocks laid along the lifelong path of discipleship. They draw us deeper into our journey of walking with God who created us, who comforts us, who inspires us, who gives us hope and brings us joy in the midst of all life presents us. We all have practices that seem to fit us better than others and practices that stretch us. If you're like me, you tend to stick with the ones that fit and avoid those that do not come as naturally. But if we do this it can leave us stagnant. If we are not willing to ask God to show us other ways to engage our spiritual life, to breathe new life into our spiritual practices we might find ourselves in a dry and barren spiritual place—a place where we feel like we are not encountering God, a place of feeling alone and isolated. We know that this is not what God wants for us. God invites us to places of refreshment with springs of living, moving, life-giving water.

I have been pondering this idea of engaging our Lenten practices beyond this season on and off and have found myself wondering the change in our spiritual lives this would spark. To "give up" Lent in favor of living lives formed by the invitation we hear on Ash Wednesday year-round. What would it look like if we were to engage these spiritual practices with a sense of purpose and passion year-round? Would the joy and grace we encounter become even more evident? Would we find our lives enriched? Would we feel more deeply connected to God and with one another?

So this year, after the celebration of the Resurrection, I'm going to try to pay more attention to how I engage these practices beyond our Lenten journey. I'll explore different practices of prayer, meditation, and self-examination and I invite you to do the same. Maybe, if nothing else, during this beautiful joyous season of Easter try the one that stretches you. For some this might mean adding 20 minutes of silent contemplation to their day, while for others it might be spiritual journaling, the act of praying through the written word, and for others it might mean praying Compline at the end of the day. Whatever it is for you, my prayer and hope is that it brings you to new insight, draws you deeper into loving relationship with God and your neighbor, and fills you with an abundance of joy!







Lenten Mite Box Offering

Finance Committee

Financial Report

Budget Performance:

Unfortunately, after two months, total revenues are below budget by about \$10,100 (about 12% below budget). This is mostly due to pledged revenue being down by about \$9,500. We believe this is just a timing issue and will hopefully correct itself in the next couple of months.

As for expenses, some categories are over-budget and some are under, with total expenses being slightly below budget by about \$1,000 (about 1% below budget).

Stop Hunger Now has a new name to better describe their mission: RISE AGAINST HUNGER. While the mission is the same, Rise Against Hunger is exploring new pathways to end hunger worldwide. The Outreach Committee will continue Christ Church's support of this program's global impact on hunger.

Rise Against Hunger is committed to achieving a greater impact toward the goal to end hunger by implementing sustainable approaches and long -term solutions to hunger in communities around the globe. Rise Against Hunger distributes water filters to communities which do not have safe drinking water. Rise Against Hunger sponsors programs promoting



increased agricultural production and improved incomes around the globe. The meals which we will pack are made up of enriched rice, soy protein, dried vegetables, and include 23 essential vitamins and nutrients so that children are able to have strong minds and strong bodies. The goal of Rise Against Hunger is to end global hunger by 2030!

You and your friends have an opportunity to help on **Saturday, April 22, 2017**, by packing 24,000 meals to be sent to schools in areas of the world where children and families do not have enough nutrition to grow and survive. April 22 is the Saturday after Easter when we invite you to join every member of Christ Church to help pack those 24,000 meals for distribution. We will work to have the task completed by Noon! Keep Day is April 8

Spring cleanup

The whole parish is invited to come and help get us ready for Easter at Christ Church. The Properties Committee has projects for us—inside and outside—and the more hands we have to help, the faster the work gets done. Cleaning supplies will be provided, but if you can bring rakes and short step ladders, that would be helpful. Keep Day is rain or shine.

Interior jobs include: cleaning sills and door panels, inside windows, clean windows and lights in Pilgrim's Chapel... Exterior jobs include: trash cleanup, remove leaves in window wells, pole lights in courtyard and outside lamps, oil benches and clean up items in the courtyard, tidy up flower beds, rake leaves and tidy up north side of Baden Center, clean gutters...

You may have noticed the excavation work going on in the courtyard on the side of the church. This work seals the church wall so that there is no longer water penetration into the Lord Fairfax Room under the church. While we did not find any bones, we did find an old metal ladle, two ceramic marbles, and other small items, You never know what you are going to find when you do this kind of work!

This was the first extensive work done on that area of the church walls in years. Not only does this address the water penetration, it also assures structural integrity to that section of the wall. Fortunately, the brick masons informed the committee that the church was built very well and the stones in the walls were fitted tightly together. The final work will be done before Easter.

Another project which you will hear more about will be the rebuilding of the front porch of the Old Rectory. The project is in the design phase and will be presented to the Winchester Board of Architectural Review. We look forward to sharing final renditions once the initial work is complete.



Parish Nurse Musings

I know none of you are experiencing stress, but I thought I might write about it this month!

One way to deal with stress is breathing. Think about a stressful situation and close your eyes and scan your body. Where do you feel the stress the most? Rest your hand on that spot and breathe in and out slowly while touching that spot. If you feel the tension in more than one spot, move your hand to the next spot and breathe in and out. Then, relax and notice that that spot feels softer and you feel more relaxed.

A second way to deal with stress is with lighting. At night or in the evening, when feeling stressed, change from bright lights to blue. Some people find he blue light makes them feel depressed. If using blue light makes you feel depressed, try red lights. Two hours before sleep, dim all the lights, including the TV and your computer. Read and relax.

Hope this gives you something to try during a stressful time. See you in church!
