## **Rector's Message**

Dear People of Christ Church,

This past month, we interred the remains of one of our parishioners in the area of the columbarium under the large plaque on the north wall of our church yard. At that gathering, we used an ancient practice of inviting each attendee to help fill the hole where the remains were deposited. I was once told that this action of helping to bury the remains is the one gift of honor, love and respect the community can offer the deceased because the deceased can never return the favor. After all, a true gift is an action done without any expectation of receiving something back. The unconditional expression of the giving action is not the item itself, but what the giver is expressing to the recipient.

In the gift-giving season of Christmas, I believe that this understanding of gift has become lost. Remarks such as, "I have to get them something because they got me something," or "I wonder how many gifts I will get this year?" reflect part of the challenge. It becomes a "tit for tat" game with the focus on getting what we want.

Ironically, the idea of a true gift is frightening because it can leave the recipient feeling vulnerable. It can create a notion of indebtedness to the giver, which makes the recipient uncomfortable. With a true gift, the recipient only feels thankfulness to receive an act of care and affection from someone else. At the very best, we can say, "Thank you."

In the incarnation of God revealing God's self in Jesus, this is a relationship, a gift of unconditional love, which we cannot repay. We are not supposed to repay it. As we receive such a life-changing/world-changing gift, our call becomes giving of ourselves to share this wonderful gift of God with the rest of the world. In our worship, in our work, in our daily lives, we have this gift of God's love to share. This is not to earn more of the gift for ourselves, because we have already received the gift. This is not to

force others to receive the gift as we think they ought to, "or else." Just as this child, Jesus, grows and lives a life that calls and shows disciples how God's desire and compassion becomes known in the world, we also continue to learn from Jesus and make God's grace known.

As I participate and watch the people of Christ Church live out our lives of faith around the parish, I am humbled by your example of your gift of yourselves to God's service. So many of you make things happen around this community which I cannot repay except by saying, "Thank you." That is one of the privileges I have as I serve in this parish.

However, we also know that there are many still who need to be invited to know about God's love in and around us. The gift of God revealed in Jesus Christ is so wonderful that it can never be used up. We will continue to find ways not tried before and expand ways which are effective in sharing God's gift. I guess you can say that our work is never done!

I know that children will still write their lists to Santa. It's an opportunity to teach children about a true gift verses a notion of selfish gain and entitlement. I know that adults will still struggle to earn God's love and control God's gift of grace. Those too are learning moments we face when we struggle to keep God's grace, rather than share and participate in making God's kingdom known.

This season of celebrating the gift of Jesus' birth is also our reminder of the challenge of how to accept a gift and offer a gift. At least for me, I know that I am still not done in fully appreciating God's gift. New experiences, new relationships, new parts of our lives keep the growth and love of God's gift alive in the world, even today. So, we are never done sharing God's gifts around us.

#### From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

This time of year finds many of us travelling or receiving visitors in order to be with friends and family. We journey around town, tending to lists at the grocery store, and maybe even searching for a few gifts. More often than not, I hear people talk about heaving a sigh of relief when we "make it" to Christmas because their lives become hectic in the weeks leading up. There is a sense that if we are not careful, the season rushes by and we feel exhausted.

So, as we enter the season of the Nativity (Advent, Christmas, & Epiphany), I'm reminded that we are invited on a sacred, slow journey; a journey that leads us through some of the most treasured stories of our faith. A journey that begins in the distant past where we hear ancient prophecies given to bring God's people hope in God's faithfulness as they struggled with the difficulties of becoming God's people in an often hostile world. It ventures into the future as our scriptures speak of things yet to come, of Jesus' return. This sacred time begins with the season of Advent and winds its way toward the celebration of Christmas and the Feast of the Epiphany in such a way that it beckons us to slow down, to hear the stories as if it was our first time, and to wait.

Along the way, we encounter many others waiting and journeying in their own day: prophets, shepherds, angels, Elizabeth and Zechariah, John the Baptist, Mary and Joseph, and the Magi. What they all have in common is that, in one way or another, they left, they traveled, they arrived, and they went back home. And they experienced something life-changing on their journey.

So wherever your travels take you, may this season be a blessing to you all and may your journeys be filled with holy moments of waiting and expectation.

## From the Vestry

## What is a Vestry?

This is the time of year that we, the Vestry, invite and encourage the congregation to discern, identify, and nominate potential new vestry members from our parish community.

Sometimes, in the Episcopal Church, we use terms such as "vestry" or "council" or "narthex," which may be unclear or ambiguous or new to some. Vestry, in particular, can be described in several ways. In language that's more corporate or business-like, the Vestry is described as follows:

"The vestry is the legal representative of the parish with regard to all matters pertaining to its corporate property. Vestry members are elected at the annual parish meeting. The presiding officer of the vestry is the rector. There are usually two wardens. The senior warden leads the parish between rectors and is a support person for the rector. The junior warden has responsibility for church property and buildings. A treasurer and a register are also appointed by the vestry. The basic responsibilities of the vestry are to help define and articulate the mission of the congregation; to support the church's mission by word and deed, to select the rector, to ensure effective organization and planning, and to manage resources and finances."

With much of this language, it is easy to think that the job of the Vestry is to run everything for the parish. However, the church is not a business or corporation, and so there are other ways we need to understand the work of the Vestry. The Vestry is a group that gathers in prayer and seeks to empower others to service in ministries of the congregation. Our diocesan canons also emphasize our Christian concern and care for one another: "Each Vestry will cooperate with the Rector in promoting the spiritual welfare of the congregation... Each Vestry member shall support the programs of the Church through a commitment to service and biblically based standard of proportional giving. Each vestry member shall also continuously encourage the members of the congregation to support the programs of the Church and to give generously towards the support of those programs; and each Vestry member shall extend personally a hearty welcome to newly baptized, confirmed, received, or transferred members of the congregation."

Perhaps one of the reasons we keep our old English terms around (rather than call it a "board") is to help us remember the Vestry is full of disciples working together to follow our Lord. If you would like to nominate yourself or someone to serve on the Vestry, please speak with John Applin, Bill Endorf, Ann McQuinn, or Sandy White. Elections will be held at the Annual Meeting on February 8, 2015.

## **Highlights from November's Vestry Meeting**

- Bruce Trant is stepping down as chair of the Finance Committee. Please thank him for his service when you see him! The Vestry seeks qualified parishioners to serve on the Finance Committee.
- The Vestry approved \$3000 in budget expenditures for the Outreach Committee (see p. 10 for details).
- The J2A pilgrimage scheduled for next summer has been postponed for a year or two to allow for additional fundraising and better coordination of schedules for the youth attending.
- Vestry members will begin writing an "Ask the Vestry" column in the newsletter.
- The Nominations Committee continues to take names of those interested in serving on the Vestry.
- The Vestry received a Certificate of Excellence for Christ Church from Apple Country Day School for our youth's service there.
- The Vestry retreat is scheduled for Saturday, March 21, 2015 at Shrine Mont.

### **Sunday School News**

By the time Advent begins, every child in the United States knows that we are getting ready for a season involving gifts. Knowing that the patterns we learn in childhood remain with us and prepare us for who we will be, we emphasize in Sunday School the giving aspect of gifts, as we wait for the biggest gift of all, Emmanuel, God with us. Each of the Sundays of Advent we take a different look at the idea of giving. We also talk about watching for gifts that may come to us from unexpected people or circumstances by God's grace. These may be different from the gifts we thought we wanted.

The season of Advent is one of preparation and imagination in Sunday School, but with a different emphasis than our children experience in the secular world. On November 30, the **first Sunday of Advent**, the scene is set so that everyone is aware that our waiting for Christmas is a special time. We will begin with a brief gathering after the Cherub Choir rehearsal to light the **first candle on an Advent wreath** in the Commons. Each week we will continue with lighting of an additional candle which reminds us that we are drawing closer to the Light of Christmas. The classrooms will have wreaths of their own and a classroom Advent calendar to measure the days. The **second Sunday, St. Nicholas** visits our classes with his gold-covered chocolate coins and, in the telling of his story, reminds us of anonymous giving, which upholds the dignity of the receiving person and equalizes the role of the giver and the recipient of the gift. On the **third Sunday, St. Lucia** (St. Lucy) is another visiting figure to show us how, in the season of giving, we give in many ways to those around us. (If you are unfamiliar with the traditional stories of these last two, come join us in Sunday School any or all of these mornings!) The **last Sunday of Advent,** each class will take a few moments to visit in the Commons where a **Nativity scene** reminds us of the gift of Christ into our lives. Of course, we remember each child with a **small gift that recalls the Christmas story**. Come join us!

Younger children will bring home small individual Advent calendars on November 30. If you aren't there on the 30th, please ask for one.

#### **Holiday Calendar Reminders**

Sunday School classes and Children's Chapel will **not** meet Sunday, December 28. We will resume the regular schedule on January 4, 2015. Watch for information about children's activities during our joint Epiphany service with Grace Lutheran Church on January 6.

#### **Christmas Pageant**

Any child who wants to be part of our annual telling of the Nativity story through the Christmas pageant should sign up as soon as possible, if he/she hasn't done so already. The service bulletins need to be printed in a timely fashion and we want to be sure to include the names of as many of the cast members as we can. Parts for general cast (non-spoken) are flexible to include as many children as want to participate. Costumes are provided for angels, shepherds, Magi, and animals. Lead parts are cast from youth in 6th grade or older.

## "Table Manners" Class for Children

On Saturday, December 6, from 9:00 am - 10:00 am, the clergy will have a class for young children (toddler on up) called "Table Manners." By baptism, everyone, including children, is invited to the Lord's table. When children come to the rail, they are full of excitement, energy, and expectancy to be able to participate in the Lord's Supper. Children need to know what to do once they get there, to learn "table manners." The clergy will talk with the children about the Eucharist, teach the children how to approach the rail, and teach them how to receive the bread and the wine (when their parents feel they are ready). The purpose of the class is for parents and children to share in the wondrous joy of participating in the Lord's banquet. We will first gather in the Tilford Room at 9:00 am to begin working on our "Table Manners."

#### **Adult Forum**

Adults are reminded that their Christian Formation options on Sunday morning include two offerings, both at 9:30 am.

Track I in the Tilford Room: We will have the final part of Joan Chittister's series, *The Ten Commandments: Laws of the Heart*. Her conversation looks at the idea that the Ten Commandments are an adventure in human growth and that we are not so much convicted by them as we are transformed by them.

Track II in the Parlors: We will conclude our exploring questions people raise as they look at the different sections of our little known treasure chest of wisdom—our prayer book's "Catechism," also called "An Outline of the Faith." Coffee can be found upstairs in the Oasis, so please grab a cup before the class begins.

### **Donations Made in the Community**

In November, the Christ Church Vestry approved \$3000 in budget expenditures from the Outreach Committee.

The Henry and William Evans Home for Children in Winchester will receive a \$1000 donation from Christ Church. The Evans Home was founded in 1949 to provide a home for abused, homeless, and otherwise needy children in Winchester and has been home to more than 500 children since 1977 (when they started keeping careful records). The Evans Home relies heavily on patrons, like Christ Church, and fundraisers for their annual funding. The Outreach Committee welcomes Mark Jaccard from the Henry and William Evans Home for Children at the 10:30 am service on January 25th. \$800 will be given to the Winchester Police Department so that they can purchase ten emergency trauma kits. Captain Doug R. Watson gave a presentation at the September committee meeting. He showed the kits and explained how they can be used to provide immediate trauma care.

Additionally, \$1000 will be donated to the Law Enforcement Foundation with a designation for use by the Timbrook House. Detective Lisa Hyde, the Program Coordinator for Timbrook House, also talked with the committee in September. This facility is located at 305 E. Piccadilly Street and is a afterschool, court-appointed program designed to develop pro-social behaviors and engage them in community service projects. The money donated will help fund dinners served at the house.

If you would like to make individual contributions for either of the police-sponsored programs, donations may be made to the Law Enforcement Foundation, P.O. Box 662, Winchester, VA 22604.

Finally, \$200 will be used to support Christ Church's participation in the Salvation Army Angel Tree project to supplement the giving of gifts to needy children by the Christ Church community.

### **Treasure Box Celebrates Anniversary**

On Thursday, November 13, special guests from the community joined Treasure Box volunteers and the clergy for a festive program and reception in the Tilford Room to commemorate the shop's 55<sup>th</sup> anniversary of charitable giving. President Paulette Jennis highlighted brief facts about Winchester's first thrift shop: the name Treasure Box was approved after one of the founders had visited a store in Canada with this catchy name; to open, the founding ladies put up \$200 of their own money and accepted a \$900 loan from the Vestry, which was repaid from earnings in two years; the ladies painted and papered two small rooms in the basement of the Old Rectory for their enterprise where the shop operated until moving to the Smith Building in 2002, a location providing more space and better access for cus-



tomers. Though adapting to changing situations over the years, the shop has operated continuously since opening the doors on November 18, 1959—sustaining its mission to fund charities serving the neediest of all ages. Treasurers Kay Jones and Sally O'Neil estimate the shop has returned nearly \$1 million to the church and community over these years.

Representatives from TB recipient charities were invited to share the moment with outstanding response. Staff from CCAP, the Laurel Center, Habitat for Humanity, Head Start, ARC, ADAPT, Blue Ridge Hospice, Free Medical Clinic, and the William and Henry Evans home shared brief stories about how TB funds have been put to use over the years. While some donations go into agency general funds, others are set aside for niceties that fall outside operating budgets to purchase such things as prescription drugs, special adaptive equipment, and enrichment activities for the disadvantaged. Marc Jaccard of the Evans Home spoke of some children who come there with little more than the clothes on their backs—no family photos or other childhood memorabilia to connect them with their roots. He has used TB donations to purchase small Polaroid cameras and scrapbooks for these children to help them build a history among those who can provide them a haven of safety and nurture. All those present were touched by the impact of the Treasure Box's community partnership and expressions of gratitude from our guests.

The Treasure Box has much to celebrate this anniversary year—the vision and legacy of its founders, the support of the clergy and Vestry over the years, the enduring commitment of volunteers, and the ongoing support of parishioners through donations. We are especially grateful in recent months to our parish donors. We are receiving a steady supply of excellent merchandise, which is essential to our ability to sustain our annual giving level of about \$12,000 per year. Of this, nearly 25% goes directly back to Christ Church as an income tithe, to purchase food cards, to fund WATTS week, and, this year, to help fund the Panda Pantry ministry. Every item donated and sold translates to funds for those in need.

Our anniversary celebration concluded with a prayer to share:

"Heavenly Father, we thank you for all those within and outside the church who share in community partnerships to provide survival, educational, and emotional supports to those most in need. We pray for continued vitality, insight, and will to sustain our shared missions and ministries in the years to come." Amen.
