Dear People of Christ Church,

On the Sunday following the tragic violence in Paris, someone asked me how it feels to preach after tragic events happen. As I reflected on that question, I began to realize and remember that I preached on the Sunday following the Columbine High School shooting. I preached after Timothy McVeigh attacked people, including children, at the Murrow Building in Oklahoma City. I preached on the Sunday after 9/11 and the Sunday following the United States invasions of Afghanistan, and then Iraq. It is exhausting to engage in the challenge of proclaiming good news when we see, again and again, not only how broken we are, but how ugly and violent we can be. Violence fueled by despair, anger, hopelessness, or revenge still results in the same things—death and destruction.

As I remember these difficult Sundays, I also remember hearing again and again through the years this important point: "The gospel is not about us; it is about God and God's love revealed in Jesus Christ." If the Gospel were about us, it would be much shorter and far more hopeless than we could imagine. Fortunately, the Gospel is about what God seeks to do to call us back into relationship with God and what that gift from God demands of us when our lives are transformed by the love of Christ.

I want you to remember that as we engage in the preparation for the Incarnation (Advent into Christmas) because this is the season when we see the abstract idea of God's love become concrete in this world. We talk about our despair, and then what God does to bring light into that darkness. We see in Matthew and Luke what the powers that be think their military and political might can accomplish only to see a human, beginning from birth, confound such pride and hubris by flipping the very notion of God's relationship through service, compassion, and grace.

"For the risen Lord, Jesus Christ, has come among you, and calls you to proclaim His love." People are transformed! Use music; use fellowship and food; use care and compassion; show grace and always seek to be the least, as servant of all.

For me, part of the good news is that I am not alone engaging the challenge of preaching in a broken world. By baptism, we are all called to face the challenge of preaching in a world of violence and rage. However, what you and I preach in our words, our actions, and our lives is not to proclaim us. That leads to failure. Instead, it is to proclaim the love of Jesus Christ and what God's light can offer in a world that fears the darkness. This challenge of discipleship is demanding. However, we also find this discipleship of Jesus to be most fulfilling and life-giving as we seek to overcome challenges.

All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. John 1:3-5 (NRSV)

Dear Friends in Christ,

This time of year finds many of us travelling or receiving visitors in order to be with friends and family. More often than not, I hear people talk about heaving a sigh of relief when we "make it" to Christmas because their lives become hectic in the weeks leading up. There is a sense that if we are not careful, the season rushes by and we feel exhausted.

## From the Vestry

## What is a Vestry?

This is the time of year we, the Vestry, invite the congregation to discern and nominate parishioners to serve on the Christ Church Vestry. First though, what exactly is a vestry and what do vestry members do?

Vestry can be described in several ways. In language which sounds more corporate or business-like, the vestry is described as follows:

The vestry is the legal representative of the parish with regard to all matters pertaining to its corporate property. Vestry members are elected at the annual parish meeting. The presiding officer of the vestry is the rector. There are usually two wardens. The senior warden leads the parish between rectors and is a support person for the rector. The junior warden has responsibility for church property and buildings. A treasurer and a register are also appointed by the vestry. The basic responsibilities of the vestry are to help define and articulate the mission of the congregation; to support the church's mission by word and deed, to select the rector, to ensure effective organization and planning, and to manage resources and finances.

This description makes it easy to think that the job of the Christ Church Vestry is to run everything for the parish. However, the church is not a business or corporation, and so there are other ways we need to understand the work of our Vestry.

A vestry is a group that gathers in prayer, seeks to empower others to service in ministries of the congregation. Our diocesan canons also emphasize our Christian concern and care for one another: "Each Vestry will cooperate with the Rector in promoting the spiritual welfare of the congregation... Each Vestry member shall support the programs of the Church through a commitment to service and biblically-based standard of proportional giving. Each vestry member shall also continuously encourage the members of the congregation to support the programs of the Church and to give generously towards the support of those programs; and each Vestry member shall extend personally a hearty welcome to newly baptized, confirmed, received, or transferred members of the congregation."

Perhaps one of the reasons we keep our old English term "vestry" instead of calling it a "board" is to help us remember our Vestry is full of disciples working together to follow our Lord. If you would like to nominate yourself or someone to serve on the Christ Church Vestry, please contact Tom Ellington, Conrad Koneczny, Doug Thomas, or Ann Wallinger. Our Annual Meeting and election of new members will be January 31, 2016.

## **Highlights from November Meeting**

- The organ is back in place and the fundraising goal for the organ renovation project has been fulfilled!

- The Vestry voted on several actions coming from the Finance committee to rename funds and move forward with their documentation and consolidation where needed.
- The Annual meeting is scheduled for January 31, 2016. Doug Thomas, Conrad Koneczny, Ann Wallinger, and Tom Ellington will rotate off the Vestry. They are charged with finding nominees.

## **Acolyte Training**

## **Sunday School News**

By the time Advent begins, every child in the United States knows that we are getting ready for a season involving gifts. Knowing that the patterns we learn in childhood remain with us and prepare us for who we will be, in Sunday School, we emphasize the **giving** aspect of gifts as we wait for the biggest gift of all, Emmanuel, God with us. What we do on Sunday mornings in Advent is emphasize our opportunities to give to others during the season—in contrast to the receiving aspect that comes to us so much more easily. We also talk about watching for gifts that may come to us from unexpected people or circumstances by God's grace and maybe different from the ones we thought we wanted.

On November 29, the **first Sunday of Advent**, the tone is set so that everyone is aware that our waiting for Christmas is a special time in the church year. Preschool through grade 5 will begin with a brief gathering after the Cherub Choir rehearsal to light the **first candle on an Advent wreath** in the Commons. Each week, we will continue with lighting of an additional candle which reminds us that we are drawing closer to the Light of Christmas. The classrooms will have wreaths of their own and a classroom Advent calendar to measure the days. We also hold up traditional stories of famous figures associated with giving.



The **second Sunday,** St. Nicholas visits our classes with his gold-covered chocolate coins and, in the telling of his story, reminds us of anonymous giving, which upholds the dignity of the receiving person and equalizes the role of the giver and the recipient of the gift.

On the **third Sunday**, St. Lucia (St. Lucy) is another visiting figure to show us how, in the season of giving, we give in many ways to those around us. (If you are unfamiliar with the traditional stories of these last two, come join us in Sunday School any or all of these mornings!)

The **last Sunday of Advent,** each class will take a few moments to visit in the Commons to prepare a Nativity scene that reminds us of the gift of Christ into our lives. Of course, we remember each child with a small gift that recalls the Christmas story. Come join us!

On November 29, younger children will bring home small individual Advent calendars with stickers to add each day to complete a Nativity scene. If you aren't there on the 29th, please ask for one. There are plenty.

#### **Holiday Calendar Reminders:**

Rehearsals for the Christmas Eve pageant will be posted weekly on the bulletin board in the Commons and repeated in choir rehearsals, the Sunday bulletin, and the weekly email update.

Sunday School classes and Children's Chapel will **not** meet Sunday, December 27. We will resume the regular schedule on January 3.

## **Adult Daytime Faith Study**

Our Adult Daytime Faith Study in December continues our look at characters of church history using the Great Courses DVD, "The Lives of Great Christians." Professor William R. ## From the Marie Cooper Fund Committee

The Marie Cooper Fund was established as a testamentary trust under the will of Nancy O. Cooper in 1967 in memory of her mother, Marie Cooper, a long-time active parishioner of Christ Church. The trust, which is administered by the trust department of BB&T Bank, generates approximately \$25,000 to \$35,000 per year which, by the terms of the trust, are to be spent equally for domestic and foreign missions. The trust specifically excludes the use of the funds for payment of debt.

The committee has interpreted these instructions to permit funding of endeavors which bring real benefit to the hungry or homeless, or which enable representatives of the church to train for or engage in such efforts. We try to adhere to the equal division of funds between foreign and domestic projects, although the balance may skew one way or another temporarily. Some of our recipients may be considered to act both domestically and internationally.

Our most significant awards in the past five years have been to the Laurel Center capital campaign (\$46,000), our mission trips to the Dominican Republic and Haiti (\$29,500), the WATTS program (\$11,000), and the Shrine Mont capital campaign (\$10,000). Our total disbursements for the years 2011-2015 (to date) total \$156,751. We have a current balance of \$23,444, which we expect to allocate and disburse before the end of 2015.

The current members of the committee are Greg Hutchinson, Tom Dame, Hunter Gaunt, Sandra Armstrong, Anne Drury, Joyce Casey, Allison Major. We welcome suggestions from the congregation for possible projects which meet our criteria.—*Tom Rockwood, Chairman*


## 2015 YTD Budget Performance

We are back to being ahead of budget thanks to stronger revenue in October than planned in our budget. This stronger October made up for a weak revenue month in September. We are ahead of budget even when the brickwork is included! After we adjust for the \$10,905 of brickwork, we are almost at breakeven for the year!



## **Budget Process for 2016**

With the annual stewardship campaign underway, we have begun the budget process for 2016. It is the goal to have a balanced budget each year. Here are two pie charts that show the relative percentage sizes of key types of revenues and significant types of expenses:



We should first look at Revenues. For 2015, the Pledged Revenue represented about 85% of the total operating revenues and the Unpledged Revenue was about 10%. The remaining All Other at 5% are generated from several other sources (such as holiday donations, income from building use, and the income from the rummage sale, etc.).



Next, we can look at Expenses. For 2015, the largest expense categories were Personnel at 69%, Diocesan Pledge at 8%, Properties and Maintenance at 7%, and Utilities at about 5%. The remaining 11% represent a number of categories (such as Office and Communications expenses and many program costs – Music, Worship, Outreach, and Pastoral Care).

## From the Finance Committee

Until Pledges are all in (85% of our revenue and a reasonably certain value) and Unpledged is reviewed and estimated (10% of revenue which is much less certain), it is difficult to make decisions about possible salary increases for staff, increases for program categories, and even consider reserves for non-annual periodic expenses (i.e., sabbatical and property reserves).

#### What does this mean as you read this in December?

It means that Pledged revenue, as the largest revenue component, is the key to developing a balanced budget. Help us balance the budget for 2016! If you plan to pledge for 2016 and have not sent in your pledge, please do so as soon as you are able.

### **Organ Renovation**

A big THANK YOU to all who donated and pledged to the Organ Renovation Campaign. We have met and exceeded our goal of raising \$165,000.

Since this Renovation Campaign will continue to collect funds over several years, we have had to utilize money from two investment accounts to have the cash needed to pay for the actual renovation work completed this year. At the end of each month, as Organ Renovation pledged funds are collected, we will move that money back into the investment funds from which we borrowed.

In the future, we will periodically be reporting on the collection of funds now that the campaign has ended. **Again, thanks to all who donated and pledged!**


