## Rector's Message

Dear People of Christ Church,

In January, at the Downtown Clergy Fellowship's prayer service for unity, there was a wonderful moment as four of the clergy and one of the members of the Islamic Society gathered around the reporter who spoke with us after the service. During the conversation, I was simply able to enjoy what it means for us as people of differing faith traditions to be more than angry or divided people. It was wonderful to listen to the dialogue and the questions it created after our prayer service.

Another part of what I have the privilege to enjoy in this faith community is seeing us do more than just talk about compassion in our different traditions. I see us actually acting with compassion as we prepare to host our week of WATTS, which other congregations have been doing since this year's program began back in November. It's amazing to see these different churches work on a successful ministry together.

In some ways, I am not sure what the surprise is when we talk about faith and service or care towards others. Is the surprise that we are able to serve our Lord even though we disagree or have different traditions? Or is the surprise that someone may have thought that we have ever agreed on everything about God? I would be surprised if anyone thought we ever agreed on all aspects of God and faith!

No matter what the surprise, the challenge and call to discipleship is still there for us. We do not do it out of fear or anger towards one another. We do not do it in order to devalue the image of God found in every human being. In our Christian community, we do it because our Lord commands us to.

Perhaps the Gospel writers have it right when they leave out any inner, psychological detail of what went through the minds of those first disciples. Instead, as Mark's gospel puts it, when Jesus calls, the disciples immediately leave what they are doing and follow. No over-thinking it. No inner-debate. No asking, "But what do I get out of it?" They just go and serve the Lord.

We will always have times and issues where we will argue and disagree with others. That is the easy part. The challenge is making sure, even in those most passionate of arguments, that we do not forget, at least in the Episcopal Church, what we say in our baptismal covenant –

*Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?*

*Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?*

*People: I will, with God's help.*

We will have moments when we reflect the compassion of Jesus very well. And then we will have those moments when we will feel that we need God's help to resolve our differences. A life in faith is never easy. However, not even life within our own families is easy. By the grace of God that we received through creation and baptism, we seek God's help so that, in the end, we can be a people seeking to make God's kingdom known rather than our own kingdoms.

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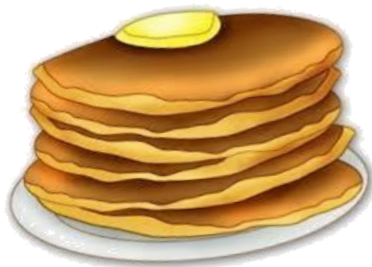
## From the Vestry

## From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

There are two things at war in our minds at most times—fear and faith. Recently, the intersection of fear and faith has been a dominant theme in many of my conversations with friends and parishioners. As Christians, the war inside of us between fear and faith is a tough battle, and quite often a battle that we feel guilty about fighting. We believe, therefore we should have faith. We should not be afraid. But yet, we are. There are things and situations in this world that ultimately make us afraid. We feel like we should be better than that! We should not be afraid. So how do we make our way forward faithfully, while being honest about our fears?

Science suggests that we are born with two innate fears: the fear of falling and the fear of loud noises. This might explain why I sometimes jump out of my desk chair if someone knocks unexpectedly on the closed door behind me. This might also explain why every time I have participated in a high-ropes course, it has required a lot of talking myself in to the climbing up part! What science and life also suggest is that most of all the other fears we have in life are ones that we have learned—everything from the basics we learn as young children (stranger danger, the stove is hot – don't touch it, a fear of water or swimming) to those broader fears of people of other races, religions, or opposing views that seem to develop inside many. They are all learned fears.

For better or worse, we all experience things during our lives that shape and change us. Sometimes those experiences and encounters with people shape in us a fear that we then assign to anyone else we encounter that we place in to that the same category. If, as suggested, these are learned fears, I wonder how long it then takes us to un-learn these fears. When we come to a point in life when we realize that automatically being fearful is in fact not the best way to approach life, how do we overcome our fears? Where do we turn?

In January 1933, during a time of widespread fear, while preaching on Matthew 8:23-27 (the story of Jesus calming the storm), Dietrich Bonhoeffer said, “In the midst of every situation where there is no way out, where nothing is clear, where it is our fault, we know that there is hope, and this hope is called: Thy will be done, yes, thy will is being done.” He went on to say that what we do in the face of fear is to call on Christ by name saying, “...we name the name of the One who makes the evil inside us recoil, who makes fear and anxiety themselves tremble with fear and puts them to flight. We name the One who overcame fear and led it captive in the victory procession, who nailed it to the cross and committed it to oblivion; we name the One who is the shout of victory of humankind redeemed from the fear of death—Jesus Christ, the Crucified and Living One. He alone is Lord over fear; it knows him as its master; it gives way to him alone. So look to Christ when you are afraid, think of Christ, keep him before your eyes, call upon Christ and pray to him, believe that he is with you now, helping you . . . Then fear will grow pale and fade away, and you will be free, through your faith in our strong and living Savior, Jesus Christ.”

This is not always easy when we are in the depths of our anxiety and fear. But my friends, it is the way through and past the fears that hold us back. Whatever fears we encounter, from wherever they bubble up, we have a strong and mighty name to call upon to help us. As we do this, our eyes can be opened up more and more to God's goodness in this world, to our many and varied callings. Callings, that as the Rev. Kristin Whitesides said in her sermon here, may call us to drop our nets, get out of the boat, and leave the familiar behind.

On Sunday, February 19, we will be joined by Buck Blanchard, director of the Office of Mission & Outreach for the Diocese of Virginia. Buck will be speaking on the topic of fear as it relates to mission and outreach at both the Adult Forum and 10:30 am service. As we continue our conversations and discernment about Christ Church's outreach ministries, I hope that you will come and join us. We are indeed called to be honest about our fears and anxieties, but we are also encouraged to call on the name of our Lord Jesus to put those fears in their rightful place in order that we might better discern God's will and faithfully follow where we are led.

### Adult Forum in February

In coming weeks, we'll learn about how Christ Church fits in as part of the Diocese of Virginia, one of the largest dioceses in the Episcopal Church. We'll consider the tremendous resources and opportunities we have as part of the Diocese. Please join us for Adult Forum on February 2, as the clergy and delegates of Christ Church who attended the Diocesan Convention on January 27 and 28 will report on their experience.

On February 12, Christ Church is hosting WATTS, which means that the Parish Hall will have lots of cots in it. We will have an informal gathering for Adult Forum—around the cots—about ministries such as WATTS in the Winchester area, as well as other projects of which we are a part in our region, Region 14.

On February 19, our guest speaker for Adult Forum is Buck Blanchard. He is the director of Mission & Outreach for the Diocese. His role is to encourage and facilitate the mission and outreach efforts of all parishes in the Diocese.

On February 26, we will look at the program for Lent, which begins the following Wednesday, March 1. This Lent, we encourage you to participate in an online series created by the Society of Saint John the Evangelist and the Center for the Ministry of Teaching at the Virginia Theological Seminary called, *5 Marks of Love: Living Life Marked as Christ's Own*. Each morning of Lent, you'll receive an email with a short video featuring one of the brothers of SSJE discussing the ways in which God's Life and God's Mission express themselves in and through us. Using the free downloadable workbook, over the course of Lent, you will explore the Anglican "Marks of Mission" through thought-provoking questions and activities. This program will also shape our Adult Forum during Lent as it offers a space for prayerful discussions as we collectively reflect.

## Financial Report

**Full Year 2016 Budget & Actual: December brought a fantastic finish to 2016!**

**Revenues:** All revenue categories exceeded budget at year-end! Though Unpledged revenue had lagged below budget all year, a December surge and some unexpected gifts resulted in actual Unpledged revenues exceeding budget by almost \$7,800. In total, revenues exceeded budget by about \$25,700 (about 4.4%).

**Expenses:** The Original Total actual expenses were slightly under budget for the year by about **\$255**.

**Reserves:** Since revenues were bountiful for 2016, both a \$2,000 Sabbatical Reserve and a \$10,000 Properties Reserve were added at year-end to the actual expenses. This resulted in the Adjusted Total expenses exceeding original budget by about \$11,700.

**Balance:** The final result is a surplus of **\$13,958**, which will be added to the Operations Reserve Fund.

## 2017 Budget and More

### Budget Challenge Update:

You may recall that the original budget for 2016 had expenses exceeding revenues by about \$7,200. In order to balance the budget for the year, a “Budget Challenge” line item was added in the revenue All Other section. Over the past few months we have received gifts that have specifically been designated for the “Budget Challenge.”

With the December surge in both Pledged and Unpledged revenue **we met and exceeded the Budget Challenge** with extra revenue to fund the Sabbatical Reserve, the Properties Reserve, and even have an operating surplus to add to our Operations Reserve.

### Operating Surplus:

At the end of each year, revenues are rarely exactly equal to expenses. The result is either a budget surplus or a budget deficit. An Operations Reserve Fund was established in previous years to hold funds from surplus years and to disperse funds, if needed, for deficit years.

There was an almost \$14,000 surplus at the end of 2016. A couple of reasons for this surplus are some unexpected year-end donations of \$5000, as well as about \$8000 of pre-paid 2017 year pledges (gifts in response to the 2017 year stewardship campaign pledged for 2017, but actually received in 2016 – these are NOT counted as expected revenue in the 2017 budget).

### 2016 was a GREAT Year!

In a recent Angelus it was asked – will 2016 be an OK, a Good, or a Great year? Clearly, the congregation responded to make 2016 a GREAT year. To all who contributed – Thank You!



### 2017 Budget



**The good news of 2016 will spill over into 2017.** Many final pledges were received late in the year. **The total revenue for 2017 is budgeted to be about \$615,500.** This is 6% higher than the 2016 revenue budget total.

The Finance Committee worked with the Bookkeeper and the Clergy to balance the 2017 budget. Salaries of all employees were increased and several expense categories were increased, most notably our Annual Diocesan Pledge and our Outreach budget.

The 2017 balanced budget (\$615,467 of Revenues with \$615,467 of Expenses) was presented to and approved by the Vestry in their January meeting.

Full details of the 2017 budget were presented at the Annual Meeting in late January, and will also be provided in future Angelus issues.

### Panda Pantry Update

Christ Church's Panda Pantry (a mission of the Outreach Committee) is so thankful to everyone who brought a bag of groceries in December for the children at Frederick Douglass Elementary School to have over their long vacation from school. Our congregation brought 165 bags of food that were taken to the school the week before their vacation began. The teachers called families to pick up the food, and also helped to deliver the bags. There were enough bags left over that some were set aside for when new students whose families are in immediate need of food assistance are enrolled. The school will also use some of the bags as incentives for the families to attend parent-teacher meetings. Your generosity is greatly appreciated by the staff at FDES, and it made a big difference in the school's efforts to meet the needs of hungry students well past their holiday break!

### Bingo Night at Christ Church

This is a family event and will end at 8:00 pm to allow time for school children to get a full night's rest! Pizza slices, soft drinks and baked goods will be on sale so come hungry. 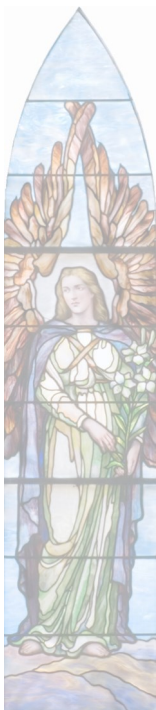

## Parish Nurse Musings

We are always being told to prepare for a weather disaster for our families and houses. However, very infrequently we are told about protecting our pets. The Humane Society of the US sent these tips: **1.** Have food and water for each pet for at least five days. If you use a can opener, have a manual one in case electricity is out. **2.** Have enough medication for at least five days. **3.** If you have a cat, purchase enough litter and bags to dispose of the waste for at least five days. **4.** Always be certain you have sturdy leashes. **5.** Have each pet wear a collar and identification tag. **6.** Have current photos of your pet in case they escape. This may help finding them, but also tells people they belong to you. **7.** Write down feeding schedules, etc. in case you have a medical emergency and need help with your pet. Designate someone you trust, and preferably someone your pet knows, in case this would happen. **8.** Have plenty of extra newspapers, paper towels, plastic trash bags, grooming supplies and, of course, pet toys to keep them amused.

I hope we don't need these items, but better to be safe than sorry!  
Many pets are lost and never found during storms.
