From the Senior Warden

Fellow Parishioners,

The Rector is on sabbatical. Should we celebrate?

Sabbatical? What a strange word. Webster talked about it in his sermon on June 14. The word comes to us from Latin (sabbaticus) and Greek (sabbatikos), but ultimately, it is from the Hebrew shabbat or Sabbath, meaning "ceasing." We all know about God resting on the seventh day of creation to reflect. We know the commandment to "Remember the Sabbath and keep it Holy." Some of us know of the seven-year agricultural cycle in the Old Testament, allowing a field to lay fallow in its Sabbath year. It is this last notion that might help us understand this time of sabbatical for the Rector.

We read in the 25th chapter of Leviticus about how God expects the Hebrews to let the land go fallow (shmita release) every seven years. If they do this, God promises to provide for them in the seventh year by making the sixth year more abundant to sustain them in the Sabbath year. God also tells the Hebrews the yield of the fields in this Sabbath year will be food for them as long as they let it grow naturally. Finally, God promises the Hebrews there will be a bountiful harvest in the years following the Sabbath year. As Webster mentioned in his sermon, this is a strange idea for us in our fast-paced, relatively non-agricultural society. How then do we, in our modern society, understand a millenniums-old agricultural requirement and how does that apply to our Rector?

The idea of ceasing and release (Sabbath and *shmita*), resulting in abundance, is difficult to process. This is especially true for us who wish to press on in order to complete the job. If we think about it, we do this on a regular basis for many things in our lives. An example for many of us is regular maintenance on our vehicles. We cease its regular activity and rest it (release) while the mechanic works to keep it running in top condition. We benefit from this cease and release because our vehicle continues to provide us transportation for many years. Neglect the cycle of cease and release for the vehicle and we pay for it. This is not to say the Rector is like a vehicle, but the principle is the same!

Humans need a break from daily activities. We need a cease and release from those activities in order to perform at our best. Our modern concept of sabbatical suggests we focus on a single activity to enrich those around us and ourselves. This enrichment may not be evident immediately but it will present when needed. God promised the Hebrews abundance in the sixth year and food during the seventh year if they would faithfully follow the plan of the Sabbath. We, as a parish, can also expect abundance if we allow Webster Sabbath and shmita. Therefore, celebrate Webster's sabbatical, pray for his enrichment during this time, and look forward to a bountiful harvest when he returns.

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From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

Be still and know I am God - Psalm 46:10

Stillness is not something that I come by naturally and I tend to have a love/hate relationship both with stillness and silence. Even when reading or working on a sermon, there is almost always some kind of music playing in the background. But I also understand the need for stillness and silence; that interior part of ourselves that craves just a little quiet, a little calm, and even a little room to breathe.

We find our lives filled with the demands of work and family. We juggle our needs with those of the people we love and care for, and while much of this can be very joy-filled, there are still times when we all are desperate for that room to breathe. We are taught to put the needs of others ahead of our own, but sadly there is also a misunderstanding out there that when we pay attention to our own needs, we are being selfish. This is a difficult mindset to overcome.

Last month, when we began discussing the needs of caregivers and how we could create a service of care for them, one of the first things we knew it would need was stillness and silence—to create a space and time to set aside the needs of others and allow ourselves to be present to God. One element of the service that I found so very powerful was the invitation to each individual to light a candle to mark our time of worship. In the bulle-tin describing this action Webster included these words, "This time is not selfish time; it is nourishing time." I think this same action and thought can be used by each of us when we feel the need for room to breathe and to be with God, to be nourished by the one who created us, redeems us, and sustains us.

How do we cultivate space to breathe, to dwell in the silence, and find space to be still in the business of life? I think a way to begin is by letting go of the notion that it is in anyway selfish to want that space and to start out small. Maybe we start with short amounts of time, lighting a candle, and repeating the words of the Psalmist, "Be still and know that I am God," as we quiet ourselves and dwell in the moment as God's presence fills us.

O God of peace, you have taught us that in returning and rest we shall be saved, in quietness and trust, you shall be our strength: by the might of your Spirit lift us, we pray, to your presence, where we may be still and know that you are God; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever. Amen. Prayer for Quiet Confidence, BCP, p. 832

- The Gardening Subcommittee of the Properties Committee gave recommendations to improve the courtyard, columbarium area, and Baden Center, where planting a cutting garden was suggested.
- The Treasurer reported that we are close to the break-even point going into the summer. Unpledged income is higher than forecasted while properties and maintenance are over budget due to brickwork repairs.
- Two of our youth attended a Diocesan youth conference in Philadelphia in June.
- Upcoming events include General Convention June 25– July 3, during which a new Presiding Bishop will be elected, and Bishop Susan Goff's visit to Christ Church will be September 20, 2015, at the 10:30 am service.




The Start of Organ Renovations

Before...












The Start of Organ Renovations

2015 Budget & Actual

We are even BETTER than the numbers below! There is brickwork costing \$7,500* (that will be charged as a Capital Expense) that has been temporarily charged to the Property/Maintenance operating account. The Finance Committee will move this Capital Expense charge and pay it out of a proper investment account after the committee has finished work reviewing the investment accounts this summer.

It's the same story as previous months. Due to timing—where some revenues have been received early, and some expenses have not been submitted or have not occurred as planned—instead of being in the negative by \$10,000, we are only \$500 below the break-even line! If the brickwork charge were moved to a capital expense account, we would be about \$7,000 ABOVE the break-even line!* As reported below, we are ahead of budget by over \$9,000.*

*** From the *flags above, you can determine approximately how far ahead of the actual budget we would be if the brickwork Capital Expense were not included in the figures. For the first five people who call Theresa Seitz (662-5843 x2) with this approximate information. an additional \$100 each (up to \$500 total) will be donated to the organ fund in their name and they will be recognized in next month's Angelus!

Annual Audit: It is time to review the books! Once again, Patty Barnes will be leading a team to review the finances for 2014, as required by the Diocese. A BIG "Thank You" goes out to Patty and the team. Look for an update next month about the volunteer team and their progress with the audit.

Organ Restoration Fund: At the June 9 Vestry meeting, it was reported that \$118,000 had been pledged to the fund and the \$15,000 challenge had just been announced. At the time of writing, the challenge had raised over \$13,000! Maybe the entire \$165,000 will be raised by the time you receive this Angelus!

From the Properties Committee

Properties Committee members continue to monitor the state of the various Christ Church properties, and individual members of the parish bring a wealth and variety of experience and skills to the task of responding to the on-going needs and to the periodic crises which buildings present to their caretakers!

It is gratifying that significant (and expensive) repairs—furnace, air conditioning, unstable walls, foundation work—have not been on the agenda in recent months. We are very pleased with the repair of the bricks which has recently been accomplished on the exterior walls of the Smith Building and on the Page Chapel. And, the final painting on the restored bell tower has commenced. (You may have noted the presence of the bucket-truck on the Washington Street side of the church.) A detailed maintenance plan for the grounds of the church has been written, and a very complete inspection report was generated by several Properties Committee members. This report will be essential for predicting the areas which will need future attention and investment.

Current attention has been focused on the need to be protected from surges of electrical power. These surges, whether from lightening or from some difficult-to-determine source, have caused very inconvenient and quite expensive damage to phones, computers, and the Smith Building elevator. A surge protector will be installed in coming weeks with three additional surge protectors put in place soon thereafter.

Another area of recent attention from the Properties Committee is the concrete steps at the front of the Old Rectory. The original porch and steps to the Old Rectory were replaced by a half-moon arrangement in the 1950s (an era not known for architectural beauty). The sentiment among committee members is to explore a reconstruction of a porch and steps reminiscent of the original.—*Submitted by Kevin Kennedy*

Bob Amos and & Catamount Crossing features Bob on banjo, guitar and vocals, his daughter Sarah Amos on vocals, Freeman Corey on fiddle, Gary Darling on mandolin and vocals, Steve Wright on guitar. and vocals, and bassist Chris Cruger. The band puts on a entertaining high-energy show, with stellar harmonies, rock solid instrumentation, top-shelf original material, plus great new interpretations of some bluegrass classics.

Bob's CD *Borrowed Time* was given a highlight review in *Bluegrass Unlimited* magazine, and his most recent CD, *Sunrise Blues*, was named "Best Traditional Album of the Year" by Vermont's Barre-Montpelier Times Argus Music Awards. VPR's "All The Traditions" radio host Robert Resnick has written: "(Sunrise Blues) gets my vote as best acoustic album of 2014."


Treasure Box News

Most of you know that I love sports! I guess that is an understatement. I read many articles about sports and the one that hit me yesterday was about bunting. I often ask my-self when watching a baseball game and there is no one on base, why would the batter bunt? Several players have said that when someone is on base that is the way to get the player home. When no one is on base they do it if they are fast, but not especially good at batting.

The Christian Century magazine talked about sacrifice as "Laying One Down For Others." Of course, Jesus comes to mind, but can we bunt for others? We may know that

we cannot gain from this bunt. We realize we may get thrown out, figuratively. Christ intended to obey his Father. In doing so, he saved many others. It was his love of man that allowed him to follow His orders.

Are there times when we can bunt for another person? Perhaps when we take a meal to someone or sit with someone or transport someone even though it may take up time we don't have or don't want to spend? Even in our own families - how about times we don't want to take time to play, read, converse, problem solve, or just be a presence? What about praying for others, even when we don't have time? Think about times you could bunt (sacrifice) for others. If you begin to say no, remember the sacrifice of Jesus! Batter up!
