
From the Rector

Dear People of Christ Church,

With the program year coming to an end, please join me in thanking our staff, all of you who help with Sunday morning Christian Formation, children's choirs, youth group, and outreach programs. Every time I am tempted to print a list of names, I know that someone will be missed. and since the church directory might exceed the space allotted to my article, I can only say thank you to everyone!

This summer, we look forward to our usual summer activities, like our Summer Bible School in July. We need volunteers to help make this wonderful ministry happen again this summer. We will also continue with our service schedule at 8:00 am and 10:30 am each Sunday morning. But that's where the "usual" ends for this summer.

The unusual for this summer begins with the organ. Taylor and Boody Organbuilders is on track to begin the organ restoration in June. However, we do not have an exact starting date. Dr. Kriewald will play the organ as long as he can into June. The Organ Committee will keep us posted and is developing ways to help the congregation continue to learn about the organ renovation. This information will come to you throughout the summer through the website, weekly emails, and bulletins.

to join up with friends dong some projects which I will enjoy. I will also be doing some personal and family projects on my family's theological genealogy, which I have wanted to do for some time.

While I'm away, all of the usual things will happen in the parish. Bridget will work with Tom Ellington (Senior Warden) and Bryan Gray (Junior Warden) to lead the congregation. The staff will continue in their work as they normally would. We are very fortunate to have retired clergy in the parish who have graciously offered to help with the Sunday morning responsibilities. So, you will get some variety of preaching.

During my sabbatical, it is extremely important that the members of the congregation help Bridget know directly of any pastoral emergencies or crises. I have written here before about not assuming the clergy know someone is sick, hospitalized, going in for a surgical procedure, or dying. This summer, while I'm away, it will be absolutely vital if you have something which needs clergy attention that you call the Church Office or call Bridget directly. If you have medical questions or need a medical advocate, please call our Parish Nurse, Helen Zebarth. Email is not the preferred way to reach Bridget if you want a timely response.

The intention of sabbatical is for me to be away. I ask that you help me be away. I will be out of pocket for most of my sabbatical, but with the clergy, officers, staff and Vestry of Christ Church, I have the utmost confidence that Christ Church is in capable hands! Tend to one another; love one another; and be the church. That is our gift and our charge from our Lord. If we do that, then all of the usual and unusual parts of this summer are kept in their proper perspective as a part of life in our family as the body of Christ.

Highlights from May's Vestry Meeting

- The Treasurer reported that we've paid back an additional \$10,000 to the endowment. We have approximately \$68,000 yet to raise for the organ renovation. And, due to unexpected increases in revenues, we were ahead of budget at the end of April. (See p. 12 for more information.)
- The Education Committee reported that Sunday School will start in the fall on Sunday, August 30, since schools in the area are beginning earlier now.
- The Vestry approved motions from the Outreach Committee to provide \$250 to the Shawnee Fire Hall (host of the summer lunch program) for utility costs and to increase the capacity for WATTS guests from 35 to 45 for next year.
- The Properties Committee reports that brick work is wrapping up for now. They continue to work on phone issues.
- The Parish retreat at Shrine Mont was a great success with new and returning families.
- Churchill Gibson (Assistant Program Director for St. George's Camp at Shrine Mont) will bring 20 teenagers to perform community service work in the area the first week in July. They will use the Parish Hall for two nights.
- Apple Blossom parade chair sales amounted to \$2500 this year, despite the threat of rain on Friday.

From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

Jesus had compassion. At the very center of his being, he was moved. Compassion is not simply an attitude or a feeling; it is a feeling that motivates action.

In the story of the feeding of the five thousand, we read, "When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick." And when the disciples want to send them away because there is no reasonable way that they can all be fed, Jesus goes a step further, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." The disciples' first response was to worry about how little they had to offer. "There are so many people down there Jesus, and our resources are so tiny." Jesus responded simply: "Share what little you have and let's see what happens."

Share what you have. Jesus takes the five loaves and two fish, he looks up to heaven, blesses and breaks the loaves, and gives them to the disciples, and the disciples give them to the crowds. Jesus gives the disciples a clear way to overcome their sense of scarcity and to enter into abundant, compassionate living.

A great question to ask ourselves about how we look at the gifts we have and use them with compassion is: "What loaves and fishes do you have in your backpack?" What do we carry with us that we simply need to offer to God to see what amazing things might come from it? What keeps us from offering what has been given to us back to the one that gave it to us? Do we think that it isn't good enough? Do we think it is too little? It takes each of us being moved with compassion and love to offer each of our little bits, our gifts, our talents, our treasure, our whole being, to God.

It takes some of us to offer an hour a week to pack food in the Baden Center so that 50 of our young neighbors will have something to eat over the weekend. It takes some of us to visit those who are not able to be with us on Sunday mornings to share in the feast, the Eucharist. It takes just a little bit of time and love, a smile and a kind word. It takes some of us to speak up about God's compassion and love for this world. It just takes courage to put aside our fears of scarcity and do something.

Jesus had compassion that day, compassion for the most basic of human needs. God calls us to be moved with compassion, to consider how we act – moved from the very core of our being – toward others, asking ourselves and our community how compassion may lead and shape us and our ministries.

It's true - we can't feed everyone; there will be suffering. We can't make it all go away. We can't end it for everyone, everywhere, forever. But that is no reason for us to sit idly by and do nothing.

The important thing about the feeding of the five thousand is not the miracle of Jesus turning those five loaves and those two fish into a meal for the multitude. The important thing is that this story calls us to raise our eyes above our own needs and above the limits of our own resources so that we can see the needs of the world around us and the power of a compassionate God who will take what we freely give and turn it into enough and then some more.

It takes your little bit, and my little bit, so that 5 + 2 = more than we can imagine, 12 baskets of extras, plenty for all and more to go around! We are called to be a community of compassion; a place and a people who show the world that God is alive, that God is love, and that there is plenty of that love to go around. What loaves and fish do you have in your backpack? Share what you have. Share what you have with compassion and be amazed, amazed at the abundance!



The mason has completed much of the exterior work on the most in-need locations of the parish buildings—including the parish hall, the Sanctuary and the Smith building. Our initial goal was to make sure the walls were sealed and structurally sound. As with any project, this job grew the more the masons investigated the problems and repairs. For all of the work that was done, the Properties Committee knows that there are still other pointing repairs to be made. The committee will continue to assess the nature of the repairs and come up with a timeline for when the projects can be done. They will also work with the Finance Committee to look at the funding options, as the work moves to the next phase.

Also, thanks to those who helped with Keep Day, our parish cleanup day. Our next Keep Day will be in early November, so please keep your ears open for when we set that date. More hands make the work go faster, and most of the work is pretty basic.

From the Finance Committee

2015 Budget & Actual:

We are STILL ahead of budget! Again, it is due to timing - where some revenues have been received early, and some expenses have not been submitted or have not occurred as planned. Instead of being in the negative by about \$18,000, we are actually ahead of budget by about \$3,900.

The table below shows the current summary of revenues and expenses.

2015: Through April	Budget	Actual
Revenues	\$177,670	\$202,028
Expenses	\$196,010	\$198,104
Balance	(\$18,340)	\$3,924

Capital Campaign Update:

We were able to pay back another \$10,000 recently. As of the second week in May, our debt to the Endowment Fund is now \$87,000. We continue to make steady progress in paying back this self-loan from our endowment.

Organ Restoration Fund:

At the time this article is being written in late-May, the fund is at \$114,334 received and/or pledged. We have received \$71,000 in cash and have spent \$30,251. That leaves \$40,786 of cash immediately available and approximately \$43,300 pledged and yet to be received.

To make our \$165,000 goal – we still need about \$51,000 to fully pay for the organ repair and renovation.

Organ Renovation

A Challenge Grant to Help Us Reach Our Goal!



The Organ Committee is excited to announce that a challenge grant has been offered as we move toward our organ renovation goal! An anonymous donor has charged the rest of the community with a \$15,000 challenge. If we meet the challenge of raising \$15,000, we increase the total campaign by \$30,000, which would be a big step to help us achieve our goal of \$165,000!

Our goal is to meet the challenge grant by August 15, as we are completing the organ renovation by late August or September. Music at Christ Church this Summer

As we hope that you know by now, our tracker organ will be renovated this summer by Taylor and Boody Organbuilders of Staunton, Virginia. As a result, the big question for June is, "What will we have for music this summer?" The answer is a bit of variety! We will use the piano, which is already in the church, with Dr. Kriewald up front and able to see the congregation singing as he plays. Other musicians will be helping occasionally with guitars. We will chant and even use times of silence. All of these are ways offer praise to God in our worship, in addition to singing.

Another question put to the organ committee is, "Why not rent some type of organ?" The committee discussed this option. The committee hopes the absence of the sound of organ music will help the community remember what we are doing this summer and raise the congregation's excitement to have the organ back in the fall. (Absence makes the heart grow fonder!) Also, the committee would like to keep financial resources going towards the renovation. While we are approaching our goal to cover the costs for the renovations, we are not there yet; so, the piano and other music help to save money.

As we go through the summer months, and the project moves ahead, the organ committee will be looking at ways to celebrate this renovation in our worship when the project is complete. We hope to develop ways to extend this celebration to the broader community. So, while the organ may be silent this summer, there will still be sounds of worship in the church and the organ committee will be busy and keep you up to date with the renovation and the plans!





Parish Nurse Musings

Who said summer starts on June 21? We have experienced some summer over the past few weeks! What do we need to be reminded about with summer as far as our health is concerned?

First is that we need to use sunscreen! It is not bad to be in the sun as long as we protect our skin. Long times in the sun require us to take a break and get in the shade. We shouldn't let ourselves burn. Also, when swimming, remember to re-apply sunscreen when you get out of the water. The American Academy of Dermatology recommends that everyone apply a sunscreen with an SPF30 every day, and an SPF50 before participating in outdoor activities.



Second, spray for insects around you. I like to suggest wearing the little device that constantly keeps the bugs away. That way you don't expose yourself to constant repellent. You can get refills for the device and attach it to your belt.

Thirdly, have fun this summer! Scale down on your usual activities and do different things—walk, hike, picnic, visit with family and friends you often don't see during the busy year. Take a nap in the afternoon. Get a good book and read it. Treat yourself by going to a museum. We have several in the community that are very enlightening.
