

From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

On a recent Wednesday, at our Noon Holy Eucharist, our Gospel text came from the 15th chapter of John. A familiar passage for many of us, John 15:1-17 is a portion of Jesus' Farewell Discourse. As you may recall, we read through texts from the Farewell Discourse on Sunday mornings during the latter part of the Easter season. I like to think of the Farewell Discourse as the great final lecture of a beloved and respected professor. In it, Jesus uses both familiar and new words to share all of those things that are of greatest importance for the disciples to hear again before he leaves them. Jesus uses the image of a vine, saying to the disciples, "I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing."



When Jesus speaks of our interconnectedness through the vine, I picture how vines twist and turn together, creating beauty. Even when vines are not in the process of bearing fruit, there is a unique beauty to them. What the disciples would understand, in their agrarian society, was how vines need to be directed and shaped. Jesus speaks of God as the vine grower, the one who plants and tends the vines, the one who prunes and guides the vines to be their most fruitful. What Jesus is expressing is that in order to maintain the heath of the branches of the vine health, the branches need to maintain their connection to the vine, their life source. The branches also require pruning.

For the disciples and for us today, the pruning of life can seem scary. We don't necessarily like to think of pieces of our life having to be trimmed back, of having to cut off things we may have in fact nurtured into being. But what Jesus is pointing to, the things that need to be pruned from the lives of disciples of every age, are all that keeps us from being in authentic relationship with God, with ourselves, and with others. Pruning in order that we may grow in our life of faith and learn to rely on our interconnectedness.

Pruning out the assumptions we have learned is opening the way for new, deeper understandings of who we really are as beloved people made in God's image. Each and every one of us, regardless of race, economic class, gender, or our pasts, is equally beloved and made in God's image. And, we in turn are called to be people who love with that same kind of expansive all-inclusive love.

Again and again, God teaches us what love truly is. Love is more than just an emotion or a feeling. God's love is a verb; it's an action. Love is a characteristic of human life. But we often forget, misunderstand, or distort love, and we hurt one another by not loving one another. Fundamental to the Christian understanding of love is that God first loves us. Before all things, and in all things and through all things – God is loving us. Love is the pure grace of the one who created us, who came among us and suffered with us that we might live in this love. God's love prunes us, shapes us, directs our growth, and abides with us.

The imagery of the vine, the branches, and the one who tends to them all reminds me just how important our interconnected abiding love is to how we live this life. We do not do it alone without the love of the God who created us, or without the support of one another. Being connected to the vine reminds us that we do not find ourselves growing, a branch, in insolation.

Our world praises being self-sufficient. Yet, what the Gospel reminds us is that we are all connected and that we depend on one another, on Christ, on the Holy Spirit, and on God in order to learn, to grow, to live a life that bears fruit! We manifest God's love most fully when we love others as we have been loved by God, fiercely and without hesitation, reaching beyond the walls and preconceived notions we have, and loving them for who they truly are—another human being made in God's image.

Preparing for the Bishop's Visit

Please mark your calendars for our annual Bishop's visitation to Christ Church on Sunday, September 10. The Rt. Rev. Shannon Johnston will be joining us for the celebration of confirmation, reception, and reaffirmation and to join with us in fellowship and conversation.

What exactly is the significance of the bishop's visitation, aside from the fact that it happens once a year? It has to do with our theology concerning bishops. The significance of a bishop has to do with our understanding of the larger Church as the body of Christ in a couple of ways. First of all, as a current community of faith, Christ Church is not the only congregation following Jesus. The theology of a bishop is the symbolic connection of all of the churches and who we are as a church family. The bishop helps to represent that connection.

The connection is also one which looks beyond this generation of the church to all of the generations of the church before. It is a notion of the theology called apostolic succession. That action of the laying hands and praying for the Holy Spirit which one generation of bishops does to the next generation, building an idea of connectedness all the way back to the first disciples.

Thus, the sacramental action of a bishop when laying hands on candidates for confirmation/reception/ reaffirmation as an outward and visible sign of God's inward and spiritual grace involves the full family of the community of the baptized, from long ago until today and from all directions of churches around the world. Perhaps a way to sum it up is the bishop represents an understanding about being a disciple of Jesus – we are not the center of God's church. Jesus is.

Questions also arise about what we mean by confirmation, reception and reaffirmation. What is confirmation? Confirmation is the rite in which we express a mature commitment to Christ and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands. What is required of those to be confirmed? It is required that they have been baptized, are sufficiently instructed in the Christian faith, are penitent for their sins, and are ready to affirm their confession of Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. As part of our Christian formation program at Christ Church, adults and the youth in 10th grade and older who have not been confirmed before are asked to consider participating.

What is reception? Reception is the action of a person who has made an adult profession of faith in another denomination being received into the Episcopal Church. We recognize this reception by the person receiving prayers from the bishop in front of the congregation. This process also involves a time of preparation and is a wonderful way to learn more about Christian living, the Episcopal Church, and personal service to our Lord.

What is reaffirmation? Reaffirmation is the opportunity for those Episcopalians who would like to reaffirm their faith and service to Jesus Christ. While Holy Baptism happens only once, people find the need at various times in their life to reflect and renew their awareness of how they are called to live out their baptism. This process of preparation is similar to the processes of confirmation and reception, but with a different focus on renewal. Those seeking reaffirmation will also stand before the bishop to receive a prayer for renewal and empowerment from the Holy Spirit.

Financial Report

Well, either due to 1st quarter reminders sent to pledge payers, or perhaps just timing of gifts received compared to the budget plan, we are back on track! Actual pledged revenue in April surged, resulting in moving from behind by about \$10,000 year-to-date through March to now being ahead by about \$3,000. In addition, unpledged contributions are ahead of budget by about \$4,000. Finally, all other revenue is below budget by about \$1,300. The end result is that Total Revenue is now about \$6,000 above budget year-to-date!

As for expenses, two categories (Property/Maintenance and Outreach) are both under budget by a total of about \$7,200 due to timing (actual contract expenses and actual donations are expected to catch up to budget in the next month or two). All other expenses are either slightly ahead or behind such that total expenses are now in total about \$7,200 below budget. Our budget had planned to have expenses exceed revenues by about \$23,500 through April, and we are actually in the negative by about \$10,250. The table below shows Actual to Budget performance through April 30.
