Rector's Message

Dear People of Christ Church,

As we have conversations exploring the rich tapestry of faiths, we also have the opportunity to learn more about our own Christian faith with its varied ways and traditions of worship which enhance our sense of the divine mystery revealed in Jesus Christ. Some of the most theologically profound moments for such learning and experience are in our services of Holy Week. These services cover the full spectrum of the human condition, from the good to the bad. These services remind us of our shared heritage as Christians, though we come from different denominations.

Palm Sunday is the service with the highest and lowest points of Holy Week, when we go from parades to betrayal. Maundy Thursday gives our family a sacramental meal which calls us to humble service modeled by our Lord in the washing of one another's feet. Friday brings us to the confrontation between us and Our Lord in the events surrounding the crucifixion. Then Saturday night moves us into the thin place between life and death where we are reminded that the waters of Baptism seal us as Christ's own forever. We also encounter the mystery of moving from death to life. Finally, the Easter services welcome in the resurrection when all of creation is made new and that final enemy, Death, is conquered.

While this quick summary is by no means adequate to explore all aspects of the events of Holy Week, I hope it gives some sense of the fullness of the human experience, joy, sorrow, love, hate, faithfulness, and betrayal life and death which we encounter in our relationship with the Incarnation of God in Jesus Christ. We are also reminded through the events of Holy Week why we place our trust in God's redeeming love rather than in ourselves.

The churches in Winchester work together to remind all of us as Christians how the events of Holy Week do not just involve one denomination or

The second event we share is the Good Friday Ecumenical Service at Noon, which we will host this year at Christ Church. The clergy share in the readings and prayers. The preacher this year is The Rev. George Fletcher from First Baptist Church.

The third community gathering is the Easter Sunrise Service on Easter morning at 6:30 am. Yes, it's really early but I always enjoy this service as we gather at the wall of the old Lutheran Church in the Mt. Hebron Cemetery because we have trumpets playing while we sing hymns as a way of witnessing to a sleeping world our hope in the risen Lord.

I was recently reminded that the best way to overcome fear and ignorance is by education and conversation. Humanity and our relationship to the Divine is too important of a part of life for me to allow fear and ignorance to win the day. In the end, we may not agree; we may not even fully understand where others are coming from. However, we will know that our common humanity does invite us into a fellowship with one another as we value the living God in whose image we are made. We might also gain new and deeper insights into what God is calling us to do through our own faith traditions as we journey together in the sight of God's compassionate and redemptive love.

From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

As I write this, we are in the middle of our Lenten journey. Winter is still hanging on despite the few glimpses of sunshine and warmer weather we have had. We wait and watch for the grey skies and snow predictions of winter to disperse, and for the trees and flowers to finally begin to bloom. It has been interesting to ponder this kind of waiting as we continue our journey through Lent, anticipating the joyous celebration of Christ's resurrection.

Admittedly, as Easter people we walk through the wilderness with the knowledge that we are on the threshold of Easter joy. Lent is a time we walk through as we ponder what separates us from God, in a way it feels a bit like wandering through darkness. But a darkness that we know cannot consume us. Darkness in the spiritual life gets a lot of bad press, yet it quite often yields extraordinary events. For instance, look at the life of Christ. Many significant events in Jesus' life took place in darkness: his birth, his arrest, his death, his resurrection.

We approach this threshold of Easter asking God to reveal to us more and more of the Light, Jesus Christ. We spend our days during Lent waiting, waiting for glimpses of the Light of the world. Sometimes, waiting and patience in waiting are not my strongest gifts. In moments when I need be patient, especially when I need to remind myself to be thankful for these forty days in the wilderness, I use these words of Paul's written to the Romans, "But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience. Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words."

Sue Monk Kidd writes in her book *Where the Heart Waits* about the spiritual transformation that comes to life through darkness. I cannot recommend this book enough! Kidd's writing, for me, is so down to earth and hits me right where I need it the most. She writes, "Waiting is the missing link in the transformation process. Not waiting as we're accustomed to it, but waiting as the passionate and contemplative crucible in which new life and spiritual wholeness can be birthed."

As I think ahead to Holy Week, this is the kind of waiting I hope we all can engage in those final days before celebrating the Paschal Mystery at the Great Vigil of Easter. Waiting with eagerness for what we do not see in the stillness and dark following Maundy Thursday through Good Friday until the new fire is lit at the beginning of the vigil. That in the darkness we may wait with hope athirst with anticipation for a spiritual awakening to accompany the renewal of our baptismal vows. That our Easter joy would be just the beginning of a new phase in our faith life.

Lenten Mite Box Offering

Classes have chosen their own Mite Box project recipients this year. Several will support the Heifer Project. Heifer has the appeal of contributing to the purchase of animals for projects around the world and in the US, but also includes other possibilities like funding the construction of irrigation, wells, etc. Others have selected from projects supported by Episcopal Relief and Development, such as the purchase of mosquito nets treated to prevent malaria.

This year, children will bring in their offering each week and each class will keep track of its progress toward the goal. Classes will learn how the projects they have chosen help others and offer prayers together for the recipients of our gifts. Please help us remember that weekly offering! The offering will conclude the Sunday after Easter.

As always, you don't have to be a child to participate! Make a dollar a day part of your Lenten practice. Like the widow's two mites, it doesn't seem like much and will make a huge contribution to our effort.

Schedule: Sunday School classes preschool through grade 5 will have a special Holy Week program in the Commons from 9:30-10:00 on Palm Sunday. Note that the time is shorter than regular Sunday School to allow for the choirs to prepare for the procession to the Old Town Mall for the Blessing of the Palms. Likewise, Children's Chapel will begin later than usual – once participants have returned from the Blessing of the Palms. There will be no Sunday School on Easter Sunday. Please join us for the family service at 9:00 am!

Adult Forum

With the Seven Deadly Sins as our Lenten forum topic, Webster and Bridget will lead discussions about how we encounter sin in our Christian faith and in the world around us. On March 6, we will discuss anger and greed. March 13, we'll talk about envy and pride.

On Sunday, March 20, we'll have a short forum discussing the Church tradition of Palm Sunday. We will conclude our conversation around 9:50 am, so we can get ready to join in the march to the walking mall for the Blessing of the Palms. Those who are not going to the walking mall can join in the Blessing of the Palms service in the Sanctuary.

Feast & Fast in the Abrahamic Faiths



For the remainder of Lent, our Feast and Fast Program for parishioners continues to focus us on hospitality and learning with our neighbors of the different Abrahamic faiths. It is an opportunity to share and learn from one another about our traditions.

On Sunday, March 6, at 5:30 pm, we will literally engage in hospitality as we invite the congregations from the Beth El Congregation and the Islamic Society of Winchester to a pot-luck dinner. This sounds odd when we are also talking about fasting, but what better way to learn about fasting than by discussing how we break the fast and feast together? We ask people to bring meals which may be associated with family traditions or favorites—side dishes, desserts, main dishes, meat or vegetarian dishes. The one thing we ask out of respect for our guests is to please refrain from bringing dishes with pork. After a time of feast and fellowship, we will also learn from other traditions about their customs and experiences around their religious times of fasting and feasting.

Then, on two Monday evenings, March 14 and March 21, from 6:30 pm—8:00 pm, we will continue to learn and join in fellowship. We will meet upstairs in the Parish Hall in the Commons area. These two evenings, we will welcome Rabbi Sperling, Muhammad Bahtty, John Copenhaver and others to lead discussions and answer questions around the basics of the faith traditions, worship, customs, etc. While we will not have dinner at these last two events, favorite snacks and finger foods are always welcome. From the Finance Committee

2016 Budget & Actual: 3 Feet of Snow = Slow 2016 Start!

Revenues: The big snowstorm in mid-January resulted in actual revenue being below budget by about \$5,000. We hope that pledgers who did not attend church due to the snow will catch up on their giving during the first quarter!

Expenses: Though some expense line items were above and some were below budget, in total, we were about \$100 over budget for January.

Balance: The result for January is that we are about \$3,900 below breaking even, rather than the \$1,200 positive balance we had budgeted.

Annual Meeting Follow-Up

After the Annual Meeting on January 31, we have had people ask about the endowment funds – wanting to know the difference between the "new" Christ Church Restricted Endowment Fund and the "old" Christ Church Unrestricted Endowment fund. In a future Angelus article, we will specifically address these two endowment funds to clarify their purposes, their similarities, and their differences.

Also at the Annual Meeting a new budget revenue line item, "BUDGET CHALLENGE," was mentioned. Specifically, this is the amount of revenue needed in 2016 to help balance our budget for the year. In short, expenses are budgeted to exceed revenues by \$7,200 unless we somehow receive \$7,200 in income above what is budgeted. This \$7,200 can come from any of the revenue areas: pledged, unpledged, holiday, prior or next year, building use, or miscellaneous. Periodically, we will keep you updated on our progress in meeting this budget challenge such that we break even at year end.

It is our hope to use additional Angelus articles throughout the year to share information about our other investment funds (Youth Fund, Organ Fund, Sanctuary Fund, etc.). The intent is to further educate the congregation about our investments, as well as the purposes and uses of these funds.

Check Writing Reminders

In order to record donations correctly and ensure donations are used for what the giver intends, it's very important to remember several things when writing a check to the church:

- If you are writing a check for Capital Campaign, it should be made out to "CEC—Strengthening Our Foundation."
- If you are writing a check for your Organ Restoration pledge, please make it payable to Christ Episcopal Church AND put Organ Pledge in the memo line.
- Please DO NOT write one check for your Organ, Capital, and Stewardship pledges! These funds are deposited into separate accounts.
- You may write one check made payable to Christ Episcopal Church for your stewardship pledge and any donation other than Capital Campaign or Organ Restoration, but please explain split amounts on the memo line of the check. (For example, "\$100 pledge and \$50 WATTS.") You may also enclose a note to explain.

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Parish Nurse Musings

It's the third month of the new year and I am hearing about New Year's Resolutions being broken! About 50% of Americans vow to change their habits and about 25% give up after one week! Here are some thoughts for you about keeping those resolutions:

- 1. The first thing to know is that lack of willpower is to blame for most of our bad habits. We don't have self-control! When we want something we have given up, we just make an excuse and do it.
- 2. Get some help along the way. Apps can help us change our habits. Look into what possibilities are available to remind you to do or not to do what you have said you wanted to improve!
- 3. Do you know it takes about 21 days or 3 weeks to form a new habit? This knowledge was first discussed in 1960 by Maxwell Maltz. It hasn't changed much.
- 4. The best way to change a habit is to set realistic goals.
- 5. Get someone to participate with you who has the same goal. Partnership helps us stay on target!
- 6. Learn as much as you can about the new habit and what it will do for your health. However, we change our habits not by just learning, but by implementation and doing the change.
