Rector's Message

Dear People of Christ Church,

I rarely find such a clear calendar designation for our liturgical calendar, but we have it in spades this year. We will end February by cleaning out the pantry February 28 with our Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper. March then kicks off with Ash Wednesday services and then it's Lent all month long. So, you're thinking that March might not be that fun? Not so fast... We have our annual St Patrick's Day Pilgrimage Party and Silent Auction on Saturday, March 11. This event is a fundraiser to help our youth go on their pilgrimage to England this summer. There will be music, hors d'oeuvres & dessert, and great items to bid on in the Silent Auction. This mid-March fun, fellowship and the opportunity to help the youth gives a brief hiatus during "Lent month."

I have a favor to ask of you as we get ready for this event and Easter in April: *Please invite people to join you*. This time of year offers some wonderful bridges to encourage people to come to church. People who grew up around the church but no longer attend sometimes want to come back to a church, but are not sure how. The key for them might be as simple as an invitation from you. It can be an invitation to an event like our St. Patrick's Day Party, or an invitation to come on a Sunday for a service. People who grew up in churches which observe seasons such as Lent and Easter are familiar with the pattern of worship, and your invitation to them may help reconnect them to their own faith experience. We have the best of both worlds right now! If you have neighbors or friends who might be tepid to the idea of church, but open to the idea of fellowship, give them a call. If your neighbor wonders when is a good time to come and worship at Christ Church, Lent and the approach of Easter may be that opportunity.

For all of the resources and programs available on ways to grow the faith community of people who are disciples of Jesus, there is still no better way than a personal invitation. The personal element helps establish real connections, gives a good place on which to build trust, and it makes the most sense. We have good news to offer and we are fortunate to have a variety of resources and ministries to give witness to God's love.

We still need to appoint a representative to Pastoral Care. If you have questions about the committees and want to know who to contact, the committee chairs and Vestry representatives are a good place to start.

With so much work done on appointments, another question came up: If a person wants to help serve in an area of ministry or with a project, do they have to be on a committee? The answer is no. The committees help to make sure that the different ministries and projects are organized and happen. The parishioners share their gifts and talents serving in the ministries or projects. Some better known examples of this might be Altar Guild, various projects organized by the Outreach Committee, Keep Day (organized by the Properties Committee), and youth/children's formation programs.

This year, the Vestry will be working on our committee structure. We have lost key leaders in the parish over the past years due to death or moving away. We also have new people interested in serving on the various committees. Any time there is a change in people and their gifts and abilities, the Vestry wants to make sure that our committees are working efficiently and maximizing the gifts of those involved. The Vestry will also continue to communicate with you about changes or new opportunities for ministries which may come up in the next year.

From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

Our Lenten journey begins on Ash Wednesday with a solemn, somber reminder, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." Remember that what you were formed out of is the very same substance that you will eventually return to. In the days leading up to the beginning of Lent, I always find people asking one another what they are giving up for Lent, people discussing their Lenten disciplines and how often they feel like failures when they do not stick to them 100%. The simple truth, my friends, is that we are human and prone to failure. We are human, and unable to make of ourselves anything else. Dust reminds us of the messes we make in life, the messes we sometimes make of life. No matter how hard we try not to we leave bits of dust, of mess, behind us wherever we go. That is why the Ash Wednesday liturgy has within the long confession. It is an invitation for us to own up to the inevitable messiness of our lives.

But, it is important for us to remember that confession always ends with absolution, with a declaration of forgiveness, with a word of grace and wholeness. Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return. These words themselves contain both confession and absolution, law and gospel in equal measure. They echo the story in Genesis in which God took a lump of clay, a bit of dust, and breathed life into it, into us. We are dust, but we are very special dust, we are dust filled with the breath, the spirit, the very life of the creator God. And when we die, we in all our dirty dustiness will return to our maker, to God. Far from being rejected for our dustiness, we will be gathered back to the one who gave our dust, who gave us, our very lives.

In the meantime, between birth and death, between dust and dust, we live in the world as imperfect human beings, as fractured angels, as what Luther called being a saint and sinner at the same time. All too often we see ourselves and our God at one end or the other of the holiness spectrum. Either we see God as a stern and unbending judge and ourselves as miserable sinners or we see God as an indulgent grandparent who excuses our every mistake on the strength of great love and ourselves as sweet, harmless, and innocent little saints. And the truth lies somewhere in the vast empty space in the middle, both for God and for us.

Yes, God is righteous and holy. Yes, God does hate sin and demands justice and obedience. Yes, we do often fail to measure up. And yes, God does love us with a complete and unconditional love, a love that casts our sin deep into the sea, as far from us as the east is from the west. And the problem is we can't find a nice middling image for God, halfway between these two extremes; there is no middle position, God is not either/or; God is both/and. God is both judge and savior just as we are both saint and sinner.

Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return. We are dust beneath God's holy feet and we are dust that has had holiness breathed into it. The God who condemns us also the God who saves, both, at the same time. Our Lenten journey is a journey to the cross, to the place where the ultimate mystery of God's eternal love is revealed. The cross is the place where God's judgment of sin and God's forgiveness of sin merge into the form of the crucified Christ. Luther said that there is only one place we can look and be certain that we are seeing God. There is only one place where God's justice and God's steadfast love can be clearly seen together. That place is Christ upon the cross.

Lent is a season that summons us to focus on the fullness of the Christian faith as we prepare to celebrate the Paschal mystery of Christ's death, burial, and resurrection. So, please, please, remember that you are dust. And please, please remember, to dust you shall return. We are dust, holy messy dust, filled with the breath of our Creator, called by that same Creator into a life-giving relationship.



Financial Report

Budget Performance:

Well, the first month of 2017 is in the books and we are very close to budget in total.

- Actual revenues were about \$1,315 less than budgeted. (Pledged and All Other Revenue were both below budget while Unpledged was above budget.)
- Actual expenses were about \$640 under budget in total.
- This resulted in the Net Total being about \$675 worse than budget.

In an effort to better inform the congregation about these investment funds, a new section has been added below. Restricted Endowment

Established: 2016

Restrictions: Corpus must attain a minimum threshold value of \$300,000 or not later than five years (2021) from creation of this fund prior to any use. Use is restricted to income and principal up to a limit of 4.5 % per year to be used for ministry and outreach.

Purpose: To collect funds that will remain in corpus and provide interest income annually

Recent Contributions: \$300

Recent Uses: None until 2021 or threshold met

Market Value: \$300.00 on 12/31/16

Authorities are recommending that as you work with anyone with memory loss, but especially dementia and Alzheimer's, that if possible try to involve them in something with spirituality. A theme that we see in these people is disconnection from self and others. Including religious material or events helps to bring them back to what they might have experienced in their traditional role in the family.
