## From the Rector

Dear People of Christ Church,

In May, the idea of retreat is definitely in the air! After the Apple Blossom Festival, there are two planned retreats for the parish—Parish Weekend at Shrine Mont and the retreat for seniors at Meadowkirk. The Diocesan Retreat for clergy and lay professionals is also in May. The Vestry went on retreat together last month, so they have already been practicing the idea of retreat.

As the word says, to retreat is to pull back from the routine of life and take time apart. Retreats have different purposes, but for the notion of Christian retreat, the individual or a group/community is to take time apart to be present to God. Some retreats are quiet to challenge us to listen to the voice of the Holy Spirit among us. Others are more for the fellowship and community as followers of Jesus Christ to learn or grow in our knowledge and understanding of discipleship or our traditions. Whichever way the retreat may be organized, you still go away from your daily life.

For me, part of the importance of the community retreat is to have a shared experience unique to the group that is going. People get to know one another better. People also experience or learn something together which they did not know before. Often, people who may have known each other for a while learn something new about each other because they are seeing one another in a different setting. In other words, relationships are broadened and deepened, and the strength of the community grows.

I found such an experience at our recent Vestry retreat. The Vestry of Christ Church meets on the second Tuesday of each month in the conference room of the Smith Building to conduct our prayers and our business. However, on the retreat, as we were talking and sharing more of our own experiences around church and faith formation, we began to share more about what has shaped our personal convictions which in turn excites our serving in the church. Conrad Koneczny shared one of his favorite sayings, which inspires his life and service: “What you are is God’s gift to you; what you do in your life is your gift to God.” That saying resonated with many of us as a new way to understand our lives and our faith in our lives.

At our next Vestry meeting, Conrad shared printed copies of the saying with those who had asked for it. At a different meeting, later on in the week in the conference room, someone saw a copy of the saying which had

been left on the table. That person said how much they enjoyed the saying and asked if they could take a copy of it with them. I enjoyed seeing how something shared on the Vestry retreat came back to the parish to be shared further in unexpected ways.

That is how a retreat should work. The things that we learn, the relationships that we build, and the stories we share while away are brought back and bring life to the parish. Sometimes this sharing happens in unexpected ways, which should perhaps keep all of us humble as we seek to be disciples.

So, as we go away on retreat, be it this month or at some time in the future, I hope that we find ways to share that experience when we come back together in our own families and in our parish family. Even the disciples had to learn after their mountain-top experience with Jesus that they had to come down from the mountain and share their witness!

## From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

In her recently released book, *Searching for Sunday*, author and blogger Rachel Held Evans writes, "...This is why I need the Eucharist. I need the Eucharist because I need to begin each week with open hands. I need the Eucharist because I need to practice letting go and letting in. I need the Eucharist because I need to quit keeping score...It's a scary thing to open your hands. It's a scary thing to receive, to say yes. I resist it every time. But somehow, whether it sneaks in through a piece of bread, a sip of wine, or a hatching bud, grace always, eventually gets through. And finally, at long last, I exhale my thanksgiving."

For a time during college, I did not attend the Episcopal Church except when home for visits. The churches I attended with friends were lovely worshipping communities where my faith was strengthened, but there was something missing in them that I had trouble identifying. It was not until I graduated and began to regularly attend my home parish again that I understood what was missing: the weekly celebration of that great and wonderful mystery, the Eucharist. Once that realization hit me, I began to understand just how much I need to be nourished and sustained by the Bread of Life.

There is nothing more beautiful to me than the celebration of this meal, whether it is on a Sunday morning, on a seaside cliff in Ireland, or in the home of a parishioner. What we share together grounds me; it humbles me; and it gives me a taste of the grace God lavishes on each of us. And the best part is that this meal teaches us about our inheritance. But it is not ours to safeguard and keep to ourselves. This inheritance is to be shared with all. This is what it means to be the living Body of Christ present to the world.

I love our post-communion prayers that clearly speak to our call and desire to be sent back into the world to love and serve the God in our world. This Frederick Buechner quote helps me look at this call to serve the world with a sense of joy and wonder. He writes, "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet." This often means leaving our comfort zones and stretching ourselves. As Episcopalians, our Baptismal Covenant demands a life that follows God by continuing in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, in the prayers, resisting evil, repenting and returning to the Lord, proclaiming by word and example the Good News of God in Christ, seeking and serving Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourselves, striving for justice and peace among all people, and respecting the dignity of every human being. This is not an easy road to travel! Yet, we readily answer, "I will, with God's help."

We cannot do this alone. We must have God's help to follow the call of Jesus in order to be the people we were created to be. May we go forth, as the blessing from St. Clare says, to "live without fear: your Creator has made you holy, has always protected you, and loves you as a mother. Go in peace to follow the good road, and may God's blessing be with you always."

## **From the Vestry**

### **The Vestry Retreat at Shrine Mont**

A few weeks ago, some of you may have noticed that all of your Vestry members were missing from church. Where were we? Rest assured, we didn't quit! (You also may have noticed that we all returned.) We were on a Vestry retreat at Shrine Mont with a special guest, The Rev. Pat Wingo, Cannon to the Ordinary. Our goal at this little shindig was to get to know each other a little better, help with the Shrine Mont clean-up weekend, and learn how to better serve each and every one of you, the church.

We kicked off our weekend on Friday night by becoming familiar with everyone's leadership background prior to serving on the Vestry and learning about the different roles that a vestry plays within the church life. This meeting, and all of our following meetings during the retreat, were led by Pat. He brought some new ideas about leadership, particularly within the church, and talked about ways to lead.

On Saturday morning, we woke up and helped with cleaning up the Shrine. The Christ Church Vestry was a favorite among the other cleaners due to our cheeriness and good humor! That afternoon, we had a wonderful Bible study based on Lectio Divinia. In our normally busy lives and meetings that usually focus on business, it was a great opportunity to share time as a vestry in prayer and community. In the evening, we did an exercise of theological reflection that can be used in processing everyday challenges that occur in the church life. Sunday morning, we woke up to share a chilly worship service at the Shrine with the other cleaners from the weekend. After worship, we came together one last time to brainstorm ideas for the year to come.

The entire weekend was a priceless experience for our whole Vestry, as we were able to share this time together away from the craziness of everyday life. The conversations with Pat and each other were valuable and allowed us to learn about one another and generate ideas. However, the best parts were the laughs, prayers, and worship that brought us together.

### **Highlights from April's Vestry Meeting**

- The Treasurer reported that the Finance Committee recently met with the Properties Committee. Expenses for the past month are right on track and revenue was \$10,000 above target. A payment of \$29,000 has been made towards the organ renovations. We have \$94,059 pledged for the organ project so far.
- The Vestry approved a motion for up to \$250 for military care packages. The Outreach Committee is also organizing our participation in a summer feeding program for local children run by the USDA/Salvation Army at the Shawnee Firehouse and will ask for volunteers from the parish.
- The Spring Clergy Conference is May 4-6. Webster and Bridget will attend.
- Planned Giving is the focus for the next Finance Meeting.
- Our Parish Nurse, Helen Zebarth, attended a Parish Nurse conference on sniper preparedness. The Vestry and ushers will work with parishioner Gary Sheppard on an action plan. There will also be work on creating preparedness plans for storms, evacuations, etc.

### Vacation Bible School - Outreach to Local Children

Vacation Bible School always has a theme that is intended to help children remember their experience throughout the year. July 6-10, we will explore ***Hometown Nazareth: Where Jesus was a Kid***, based on stories from Luke, Matthew, and John. The stories will take kids back to Nazareth, where they'll discover that the carpenter's son is really God's son. They will learn about God's word at work in a person's life, go to Fun & Games for high-energy, low-tech activities, and visit the Marketplace for snacks and crafts, and enjoy those unforgettable VBS songs. 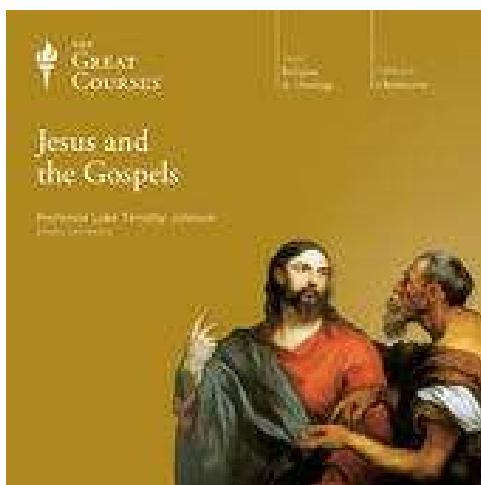

## Organ Restoration

### If the organ is dusty, why don't we dust it?

One of the reasons cited for the upcoming organ restoration project is that the organ is dusty and needs a thorough cleaning. Are you wondering why we can't do that ourselves?

We all understand how quickly dust accumulates in our homes. For those without allergies, it causes little harm. But dust is the enemy of the pipe organ.

In his article, "*In the wind...*," in the April 2015 issue of *The Diapason* (p. 19), John Bishop explains:

"A bit of dust gets into a toehole, and winds up sitting on the note valve. Even if the valve is held open a tiny slit, the resulting trickle of air is enough to make a pipe whimper. A fleck of dust gets caught in the armature of a magnet, and the note won't stop sounding. And I'm telling you, you wouldn't believe how tiny, almost invisible a fleck is enough to do that. Lots of organ reed pipes, especially trumpets, are shaped like funnels, and they aggressively collect as much dust as they can. A little speck jolted off the inside of a reed resonator falls through the block and gets caught between the tongue and shallot. No speech."

So, *clearly*, dust is the enemy of the organ! In scenarios where uncommon dust will be created in the church, like plaster repair, carpet removal, HVAC changes, etc. significant work must be done to protect the organ from dust—using lots of plastic and tape. But everyday dust builds up, too, and is not easily "swiffered." Moving the dust around can, in fact, cause dust to get into any of the thousands of pipes causing problems.

The restoration project to begin later this spring will include repair of collapsing and bending pipes, cleaning the pipes and the organ, racking the pipes, and the installation of lights and wiring. It will require the removal of all 1,634 pipes from the organ. The damaged pipes will be taken to the Taylor and Boody factory in Staunton, Virginia, to be repaired. The undamaged pipes will be stored in pipe trays in the choir loft. While the damaged pipes are being repaired, the remaining pipes, wind chests, and walk boards will be cleaned and work lights will be installed. Any new rack components will also be constructed during this time at the organ shop.



When finished, the repaired and cleaned pipes will be reinstalled, along with the new racks. The remaining pipes will then be re-installed. As the pipes are put back into the organ, the instrument will be re-voiced, regulated, and thoroughly tuned. The congregation will undoubtedly notice a significant improvement to the organ after its restoration!



## Outreach Committee

### Children's Summer Feeding Program - Volunteer Opportunity

The statistics show just over fifty percent of the elementary-aged school children in the City of Winchester qualify for the free lunch programs provided through the schools. During the school year, our Panda Pantry program helps ensure that kids at one elementary school have food for the weekends. In an effort to continue this support through the summer, when hungry kids are not fed at school, we have found an opportunity to participate in a children's summer feeding program run by the Salvation Army.

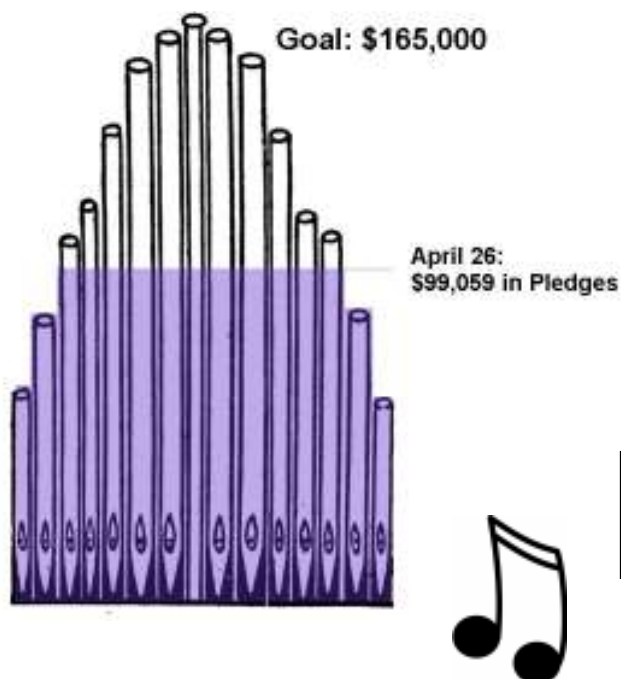
This community program will run for eight weeks through June and July. The Salvation Army will provide meals to kids of all ages at the Shawnee Fire Hall where firemen have offered to host the meals. The Salvation Army will bring in prepared food and various groups will be assigned a day each week to provide volunteers to serve.

Christ Church volunteers are needed on Mondays in June and July from 11:00 am until 1:00 pm. There will be ten volunteers needed each Monday. Each volunteer will have to attend a training session at the Salvation Army prior to volunteering. This training has not yet been scheduled.

## From the Finance Committee

**2015 Budget & Actual:** We are ahead of budget! Due to timing - where some revenues have been received early, and some expenses have not been submitted or have not occurred as planned – instead of being in the negative by about \$11,000, we are actually ahead of budget by almost \$12,000.

**Organ Restoration Fund:** After the first week of April, the fund is at \$94,059 received and/or pledged. We have slightly over \$18,000 of actual cash in the bank, while the rest is pledged and or spent (in our down payment) already. **We still need \$70,941 to fully pay for the organ repair and renovation.**

**Capital Campaign Update:** Our debt to the Endowment Fund is now below \$100,000 at \$97,000. If contributions come in as expected, we should be able to pay back another \$10,000-\$15,000 by end of April. We continue to make steady progress in paying back this self-loan from our endowment.

### Our Holey Wall

Before...



Ah, our holey wall! The pictures to the left show the front of the Old Rectory just to the right of the front door. The brick masons removed bricks that were damaged or had shifted out of place, exposing the first layer of brick wall behind the façade. Magnification of the photo would show that the original lintel (a piece of wood or stone that lies across the top of a door or window and holds the weight of the structure above it) was made of wood, allowing for the shifting of the exterior brick wall over time. This lintel was replaced with a steel lintel, the bricks were replaced and the exterior is now good as new, as seen in the bottom photo.
