From the Rector

Dear People of Christ Church,

Believe it or not, with May coming up, we find ourselves at the end of the program year and heading into summer. It will be a quick wrap-up because May begins with the Bloom, and then Parish Weekend at Shrine Mont, and then high schools start graduating on May 27th. We are not even to Pentecost yet (which is June 4th) and things are already wrapping up!

Before you get too comfortable for the summer, please note that the next program year will ramp up quickly in August and September. The year begins with our bishop's visitation on Sunday, September 10, with the Rt. Rev. Shannon Johnston. This means that we will begin our preparation for the Bishop's visit during the summer for those who wish to be baptized, confirmed, received or who want to reaffirm their faith. Even though we might think that we get the summer off, we will still have this preparation process to work on.

People often ask what these terms mean. Baptism is where we begin. Baptism is one of the two main sacraments (the other is Holy Eucharist), which were passed down from our Lord in scripture. It is the sacramental action whereby an individual is fully brought into the body of Christ, the Church. Baptism is a one-time event, so if you were baptized at any point in your life with water, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, you are a member of the Holy Catholic Church. If you were not and wish to be, then the Bishop's visitation is a wonderful time to do that.

The other sacramental actions in our tradition involving our bishop's visitation are as follows:

Confirmation is the rite in which we express a mature commitment to Christ and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands. What is required of those to be confirmed? It's required that they have been baptized, are sufficiently instructed in the Christian faith, are penitent for their sins, and are ready to affirm their confession of Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. As part of our Christian Formation program at Christ Church, adults and the youth in 10th grade and older who have not been confirmed by a bishop before are asked to consider participating.

Reception is the action of a person who has made an adult profession of faith in another denomination being received into the Episcopal Church. We recognize this reception by the person receiving prayers from the bishop in front of the congregation. This process also involves a time of preparation and is a wonderful way to learn more about Christian living, the Episcopal Church, and personal service to our Lord.

Reaffirmation is the opportunity for those Episcopalians who would like to reaffirm their faith and service to Jesus Christ. While Holy Baptism happens only once, people find the need at various times in their life to reflect and renew their awareness of how they are called to live out their baptism. The process of prep-

aration is similar to the processes of confirmation and reception, but with a different focus on renewal. Those seeking reaffirmation will also stand before the bishop to receive a prayer for renewal and empowerment from the Holy Spirit.

The main thing to be aware of with all of these is that the time to ask questions and prepare will occur over the summer. Bridget and I are always available to answer your questions concerning any part of the bishop's visitation or baptism, confirmation, reception. We find that you get much more out of the process if you let us know earlier in the summer what you would like to do, so we can talk about how best to prepare you.

Our program year is wrapping up and the next one will start up soon enough. Fortunately, the bishop's visitation helps us to be aware that the family of faith is not only when we have Sunday School, but when we gather week after week to celebrate the fellowship of our parish and diocesan family and the presence of our Lord in those times which we celebrate as we grow and mature in our faith.

Highlights from the April Vestry Meeting

- The Vestry, as it examines the committees of Christ Church, has asked the Outreach Committee to do a ministry review and report on goals and objectives.
- The Properties Committee continues work on its list of projects including progress with the new porch rendition for the Old Rectory, minor structural repairs to the Smith Building basement area, and some painting that needs to be done.
- Parish Life will organize two events in May and June to welcome new people to the community. The first in May will be focused on families and the event in June will have a more mature focus.
- Bridget reported that the youth retreat at Shine Mont was great. Martha Griffin and Barry Schnoor were the vestry members who participated.
- The Communications Committee is looking to convert the current website to a format that is more userfriendly for the website administrator. The new website would also be better suited for mobile viewing. Changes to the content would be minimal.
- Webster outlined a mini-retreat for the Vestry which would be done in three sessions at the church to inform newer vestry members, to talk about the organization of church functions, and to discuss ways of involving new people at Christ Church.

From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

In her poem titled "The Church Year," Ann Weems writes:

The church is Easter. Out of Death: Life.

Out of blackness: a lush green world,

flowers in the ice,

sunrays in the storm,

mustard seeds galore.

Our souls enter a spiritual springtime,

Our bodies given over to leaping and dancing,

Our very beings saturated in hosannas.

Our shouting crashes in upon this world: The Lord lives!

We live!

Resurrection resounds throughout our community.

I love that phrase: "Resurrection resounds." On Palm Sunday, Jesus declares that if the people are silent, the rocks will cry out. When Easter comes, resurrection resounds. On the days following Easter Sunday, we read of Jesus' resurrection appearances. We read as he appears to various configurations of his disciples in the garden at the tomb, on the road to Emmaus, on the mountain in Galilee, in the locked upper room, Jesus appears and resurrection resounds. The story is retold; the truth that out of death there is life echoes and a new community is born.

Often, in our lives, it seems we notice more easily the presence of death - anxiety, loss, fear, hatred. It can be hard for many of us to see beyond what fills our days with what seems like an endless stream of death such as this. They are a reality of the world we live in, but we have a choice in how we respond because we believe in something, someone that conquers death itself. We who have joined with those first disciples, who have been changed by the presence of Jesus in our lives, are called to have a resurrection perspective. It does not mean that we ignore the deaths we encounter, but it does mean that we see and share that the Lord lives. We are called to be people who see and acknowledge the presence of life.

In the days following Jesus' resurrection, as he appears to his disciples there is often a common theme: go, tell, share that out of death comes life, out of the darkest of darks the light of the world shines brightly one, that resurrection resounds. I invite you, during this glorious Easter season to take notice of where you see resurrection resounding? I would encourage you to pay attention to where you see glimpses of resurrection, in your own life or in the world. And consider how you as a disciple resound resurrection in this world.

Resurrection resounds; thanks be to God!

The Parochial Report

Each year, Episcopal churches are required by canon to submit a Parochial Report to the Diocese which includes information on membership and finances. We just finished the report for 2016 and wanted to share some interesting information from it:

Average Sunday attendance at Christ Church in 2016 rose to 216 to from 209 in 2015. Of the numbers the churches report, this is the number least subject to "interpretation" as it is simply an average of those counted on Sunday mornings. We also report the number of baptized members and communicants in good standing, which are harder to measure accurately than attendance.

This year, we recorded 42 people who are active in the church but not members or communicants in good standing. These are people who are involved in the parish community but not technically members. This is a wonderful number to report as we welcome new faces into the community. This number was just 14 in 2016.

We reported two marriages, four burials, seven baptisms, and ten confirmations. We had 65 youth and children in the Sunday School program.

In the financial section, one interesting note is \$21,520 in "Other income." This money largely comes from the successful rummage sale we have each fall. It is a huge fundraiser for our parish. The financial section clearly demonstrates how our parish relies on giving to operate, while other churches may rely on endowments.



Financial Report

Budget Performance: Unfortunately, the March results were very similar to February. (Revenues were down and expenses were slightly under budget.)

- Total revenues were again below budget for the month and the total for the quarter ended up below budget by about \$16,000. (It was about \$10,000 below through February.)
- Total expenses were also below budget slightly in March and the total for the quarter ended up below budget by about \$5,000. (It was about \$1,000 below through February.)

Most of the revenue shortfall is in the Pledged category and we are hoping that recently mailed 1st quarter statements will remind pledge donors to get caught up! In summary, we are about \$11,000 behind plan, because revenues are down. The table below summarizes with actual dollar values:
