Rector's Message

Dear People of Christ Church,

To begin a busy October, we have our annual service of the Blessing of the Animals on October 4, which is a tradition associated with St. Francis of Assisi. Each year, I am asked these questions: From the adults, "Do we do exorcisms to drive the devil out of their pets?" And from children, "Will my pet go to heaven?" These questions provide a wonderful teaching moment about something we often forget – that creation is good and the hazard of personification is when we take personification literally.

In the stories of creation, as God goes through the days of creation, God is content, excited, and perhaps even relieved that what God is creating God deems to be good. I would like to think that part of what makes creation good is the fact that God's creativity involves God being in relationship with whatever God creates. So with all of creation, as we consider the great mystery of death, God claims all of God's creatures. Why? Because that is God's prerogative as creator. If we open up the concern about heaven to be more than if it is up or down, and focus more on God's claim on creation, then death as part of God's creation means God's creatures, pets included, are always claimed by God.

However, the human struggle—which is our human broken condition beginning in the third chapter with Adam and Eve—reveals challenges we, God's creatures made uniquely in God's image, face because of hubris and temptation. The Biblical witness shows again and again how we break with God. Personification (the practice of representing a thing or idea as a person in art, literature, etc.) is a way to safely explore issues of human struggle because the issue is kept at a distance often done in the stories and movies of animals struggling with human issues. *The Lion King* and *Brother Bear* are good examples. Often, for children (and sometimes adults) the personification is so effective that try to place our human brokenness onto the other animals of God's creation. Thus, the human anxiety of being accepted by God knowing how messed up we are is placed on the rest of creation as well.

The reason for the exploration of this issue is that we can confuse what we are doing at the Blessing of the Animals. We are not forgiving animals their sins. Our sins are not their sins. We need to seek forgiveness, not the animals. Rather, we are simply giving thanks to God for the gift and blessing of our pets. If anything, this is a service of stewardship to remind all of us of our charge in creation to be stewards of God's creation. We have a charge to care for our pets because we have the blessing of companionship from the pets. We cannot

allow our sins of human arrogance, selfishness, and hubris to be used against our pets, or the rest of creation because all of creation suffers from our abuse of that basic charge to be stewards of this dominion called God's creation.

If you wonder about this understanding of our need to care for God's creation going even to the extent of how we seek to bring ourselves back into relationship with God, then you are on the right track. The full expression of God, self-revealed in Jesus, reminds us that God's commitment to us is 100%. We should reflect such commitment toward God, and even with one another, because we have the blessing of our lives and the lives of those around us. To express that love, we give – give of ourselves in relationships, showing up as people, and making offerings of ourselves to God in what we do, who we care for and how we share.

Is this leading to a reminder about annual giving to God through the church? You bet! Just as we say thank you to God for our pets and this grand creation (no better work of divine art than a tree in the Valley in the fall!), we also give thanks for one another in our fellowship with the Oktoberfest dinner. We also give thanks to God in how we learn to care for our health and well-being through events such as the Health Fair. As the organ goes back in and all of our programs of fellowship, formation, service and worship go on, I am so grateful for you participating in the life and witness of our Lord through our parish family.

So, please reassure your children that God always claims God's creation. Our struggle with human sin is not the same for the animals. I pray that we may all learn that our sinful condition often hurts God's creation, intentionally and unintentionally. Our charge is to apologize, and turn to different ways to care for God's creation. Why? Because we can and we are supposed to. The exercise of stewardship is not optional for us; it is necessary. Otherwise, we get so out of shape from stewardship that we fail to realize the beauty of giving to God from whom we have received so much.

From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

There is something about water. How it can both invoke a sense of fear with its sometimes unseen depths and tumultuous waves and yet the rhythm of those same waves that can provide a sense of comfort and overwhelming awe at God's creation? Water plays an important role in the stories of our scriptures. We read as the people walk across the dry ground as the waves are pushed back escaping the slavery of Egypt and walk further on the journey to the Promised Land. When the people are thirsty, God provides water for them to drink. Jesus is baptized in the river as the Holy Spirit descends upon him and his ministry begins to take further shape. These are just a few of the places in scripture that water provides what is necessary for the people and helps them continue their journeys.

There are also points where water calls the people of God to let go of the need to control and whatever is frightening them and instead to trust. In the gospel according to Matthew, we read as Jesus sends the disciples ahead of him in a boat to the other side of the lake and as night fell the boat was far from the shore. The story goes on to say how in the early morning light Jesus began walking toward the boat and the disciples who mistaken him for a ghost. Jesus speaks to them saying, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid." Peter, ever the front man, tells Jesus that if it truly is him, for Jesus to call him out of the boat and Peter will walk to him. Peter's walk to Jesus is going just fine until he drops his focus from Christ and instead lets the crashing waves and swirling wind distract him.


Another of my favorite water scenes comes from Luke chapter five. In this story, Jesus is standing by the lake and observes two boats of fishermen washing their nets after an unsuccessful day of fishing. Jesus asks to go out in one of the boats and teaches the people gathered on the shore line. Then he tells Simon to, "Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch." The fishermen do as Jesus says, and they end up catching more fish than they know what to do with. It's this amazing moment of faith in the promised abundance that God creates for all. Where the fishermen had experienced and felt scarcity, God provided abundantly.

I think many of us can identify with Peter. We want to follow Christ, we want to trust as we walk in faith, but those crashing waves and swirling winds of this world and our lives pull our focus away. Like the fishermen, we have probably found ourselves exhausted and doubtful that the abundance is there. And in those times, we search for the safety of the shore, removing ourselves from the deep waters. But God calls us out of our comfortable shallow waters, those places we feel safe and secure, to venture into the depths of God's abundance. The beauty of grace is that our God is a God of countless second chances. God calls us each day to live bravely, trusting in the promise of abundance letting go of our fears and to be changed by the living water that has been given to us.

Pastoral Care

About the Discretionary Fund

Clergy discretionary funds are a well-established tradition in the Episcopal church, but one that is not well understood. Most of us are correctly aware that the discretionary funds are used to help the poor. Many, incorrectly, believe that discretionary funds may be spent absolutely any way the clergy wish.

The principle purpose of the discretionary fund is to aid the poor and assist members of the parish and the larger community who are in need. The discretionary fund may also be used for any legitimate business of the parish as long as it does not personally benefit the members of clergy who are authorized to distribute the funds. However, from a stewardship perspective, the discretionary fund should not be used for activities that rightfully belong to the operating budget. For example, the speaker's honorarium for the parish weekend should be paid out of the parish weekend budget and not the discretionary fund.

The discretionary fund is maintained through designated gifts to the discretionary fund. The Vestry has voted to restore the practice of having the unspecified plate offerings on the first Sunday of each month go towards the discretionary fund. This practice begins this month on Sunday, October 4. Contributions to the church are always welcome, especially to either the General or the Discretionary Fund. These contributions are made preferably through checks payable to "Christ Episcopal Church" with the fund specified in the memo line. Such contributions are tax deductible.

Please note that any checks written as payable directly to the clergy (or any cash specifically addressed to the clergy), by IRS rules, must be declared as income, just as tips are income to wait staff. Such gifts to the clergy are not tax deductible.

Cook for The Shepherd's Table

Do you like to cook? Do you like helping others? The Shepherd's Table ministry at Christ Church is well organized and makes it very easy for its volunteers to be involved with the church and do Christ's work helping those in need. As a mom who works full time, I was a little anxious when I was asked to consider joining this ministry. As it has turned out, this is one of the easiest and most rewarding things I have been able to do. This is how it works:



Someone in our church family has a need. They may be ill, recovering from surgery or for any other reason find themselves unable to prepare food for themselves or their family for a short period of time. An email goes out to our large group of volunteers letting everyone know how many meals are needed, at what times, where they should be dropped off, and if there are allergies that should be avoided. At this point, it is entirely up to me as a volunteer to determine if I have the time right now or not. If not, I can just skip it and wait for an email another day when my schedule is more flexible. If I do have time, I simply follow the link in the email to TakeThemAMeal.com where I can see the requested schedule and its details. I sign up for one meal, indicate what I'm going to bring, and click OK. It really is THAT EASY. Sometimes, I just double whatever we were going to have for dinner anyway. And the last time, I really lucked out when my daughter did all the cooking for me! It has been a great way to get her involved as well.

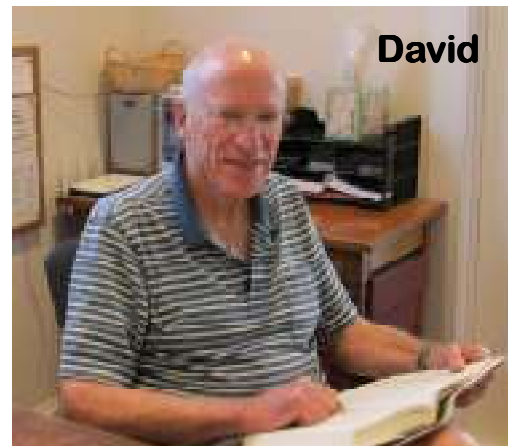

From the Finance Committee

2015 Budget & Actual: Take notice of the Adjusted Net Total* - At their meeting in late August, the Finance Committee voted to postpone any decision about moving the “Brickwork” Capital Expense out of the operating budget until year-end. If 2015 revenues exceed expenses for the full year, then some or possibly all of this brickwork charge may be absorbed into operations for 2015. This would leave the investment funds to be available for other capital repair items.

The same story continues... Some revenues have been received early and total revenues still exceed budget while true operating expenses are very close to plan – resulting in our being ahead of budget even with the brick repair work still included in operations.

The Adjusted Net Total* removes the brickwork expense. The table below shows current details of all budget categories.

From the Properties Committee

Properties Priorities

The Properties sub-committee met on August 19, 2015 to go over the newest building priorities list based upon the inspections completed by James Baden, David Wingenbach and Sandy White. The list is divided into three sections.

Safety: Includes phone and electrical system updates (in process), courtyard plantings, rectory porch, storage area for combustibles, smoke detectors, anti-tip for stoves, glass in chapel door, asbestos in lower sanctuary, old lead paint, and elevators in two buildings

Building “envelope” and structures: Includes concerns about asphalt shingles at the Baden Center, roof paint and repair seams on church (completed), exterior trim rafters, floor joists, cracks in exterior walls, and brick (completed) in sanctuary, sagging lintels (fixed), foundation work, and stained glass frames in need of painting

Function, energy-efficiency, and quick fixes: Involves the toilets in the vesting room, plaster on walls under sanctuary, water heater venting door (vents not large enough), insulation under Baden Center floor, attic roof vents in sanctuary, window upgrades, and ventilation in upstairs bathrooms and floor drains.
