## Rector's Message

Dear People of Christ Church,

It's odd for me not to say "Welcome Back!" to the school-aged children in the congregation at the beginning of September, but this year they have been in school already for two or three weeks. While grown-ups are usually known for being resistant to change, I have found these younger people not thrilled with this change in their schedule! I will just say, then, that I hope everyone had a wonderful summer and is looking forward to the start of the new program year at Christ Church!

As we move into the fall, I need your help. At a parish membership workshop which I attended, they cited a statistic that 40% or fewer of people in a congregation read the parish newsletters. Since you are reading this, statistically speaking, you are among the 40% or fewer, and I am grateful for your desire and commitment to know what is going on in the parish. That commitment is the reason that you can help.

September is always a busy time as we begin a program year. The newsletter tries to present all of the services, ministries, and programs which are part of the life of Christ Church. I cannot think of a better resource to help the community know what is going on in the life of the parish. Some of the things that you will find in this issue will be the Christian formation and study programs, youth and children's activities, outreach opportunities and information on parish finances. The newsletter often shares news, as well! ## Highlights from August's Vestry Meeting

- The end of July budget shows our Net Total is slightly behind for the year but better than projected. Overall, revenue is ahead of the budget despite the fact that unpledged revenue is less than projected. Please be sure to keep up with your pledges.
- As a result of the fund review, all funds/accounts from Edward Jones were moved to the Trustee of the Funds account which is managed by the diocese in order to help improve earnings. The Vestry also approved several motions to move significant bequests to the Endowment fund.
- The Parish Life Committee is soliciting help for funeral coordinators. Sylvia Petrie has also expressed her appreciation and gratitude of the support parishioners have given at times of funerals.
- The Pastoral Care Committee sends thanks to Greg Whitmer for creating an online home for the prayer list.
- The Outreach Committee reports that the Panda Pantry has been overrun with generosity! The Rotary grant and numerous volunteers are making it possible to serve 23 families (46 bags), so far.
- The Properties Committee reports that the mortar on the Smith Building wall is still under repair and the lightning strike incident is being investigated to determine how much damage was done and what needs to be done to prevent future incidents.
- Christ Church will host the Annual Health Fair on October 12.
- The Christ Church Rummage Sale will be on October 24-25 this year. Volunteers are needed!

## From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

It is hard to believe that it is time for us to begin our fall programming. It seems as if summer has flown by. Despite how quickly summer has come and gone, I can't help but love this time of year! As the summer heat starts to subside and back-to-school preparations are at their peak, I still visit the school supply section to see what new and wonderful treasures I might find! The beginning of the program year here at Christ Church brings me that same sense of joy. There is a sense of excitement that fills the air as we look to the fall. For me, fall is a time I instinctively think more about what it means to learn and grow.

We tend to think of learning and growing as measurable terms. We complete a grade in school and move to the next. A group grows larger and needs more space to meet. 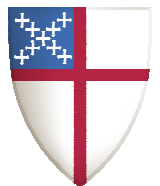

### Acolyte Training

Serving as an acolyte is a special way for youth, grades 4<sup>th</sup> and up, to serve in our worship. John Wall's Dictionary for Episcopalians says, "An acolyte is a lay person who assists in worship by carrying the processional cross, lighting and extinguishing candles, holding a torch and the gospel reading, helping with the presentation of the bread, wine, and gifts of the people, and assisting the deacon or priest in the preparation of the altar for communion."

Youth, for many generations, have served in this important role in our worship in many churches, including Christ Church. For those who are shy, you do not need to say anything. In fact, the acolyte's goal should be to remain obscure as you serve so people are not distracted during the worship. For those who want to lead, it is a valuable experience, not only as leader with the procession, but also teaching and supporting younger acolytes as they learn. For those who want to serve, it is a wonderful example of service in helping the clergy set the table. For those who worry about not being qualified, do not worry! We train all acolytes and review the training before the services.



Our next acolyte training is Sunday, September 21. We will have lunch for the acolytes AND their parents. The acolytes will train and be fitted. The parents will meet with the clergy to go over scheduling and ways we need the parents to help with the acolyte program. ## Christian Formation

### Daytime Adult Faith Study for Fall

Last spring, we began a faith study using a DVD series led by Marcus Borg on adult faith. This fall, we are continuing the study using a DVD series called “Embracing the Prophets in Contemporary Culture,” led by Walter Brueggemann. The meetings are the 2nd and 4th Thursday of each month, beginning September 11th at 10:00 am in the Parlors.

### Lectionary Bible Study

The Episcopal Church follows a calendar of scripture readings which is called the Revised Common Lectionary. The lectionary lists the readings from the Old Testament and New Testament that we read each Sunday. The challenge, for us, is taking time to read, think about, and discuss these readings outside of Sunday’s service. The Wednesday morning Bible study offers everyone attending the opportunity to meet with one of the clergy and have an opportunity to study and reflect upon the readings for the following Sunday. The conversations are varied each week because people find themselves drawn into one text or another. This helps the study and conversations stay lively in the one hour of time in which the groups meets! The Lectionary Bible Study is on Wednesdays from 10:30 am until 11:30 am in the conference room of the Smith Building (upstairs from the Treasure Box). We hope that you will join us beginning Wednesday, September 10th.

### Women’s Bible Study

The *evening* Women's Bible Study will kick off the fall season on Wednesday, September 3rd, at 6:30 pm at Judy Whiting's home. We will discuss what we would like to study at this meeting. # Christian Formation

## Sunday School

Welcome to Sunday School! Newcomers and returning students alike! Our 45-minute Sunday School classes begin Sunday, September 7th, at 9:30 am in the classrooms surrounding the Commons on the second floor of the Parish Hall. Look for the banner as you enter the Tilford Room.

Registration forms are available online at [www.christchurchwinchester.org](http://www.christchurchwinchester.org). You may also fill out a form in person on September 7th.

We continue to strive to offer the best opportunities for faith formation of our children and youth. Our curriculum for ages 2½-grade 5 is *Weaving God's Promises*, an Episcopal curriculum with lots of options for presentation of Bible stories and activities to help children make them their own. Quoting from the curriculum description, it is “designed to provide children with the basic knowledge of Church teachings in Christian education, workshop and service. The great stories of the Bible from both the Old and New Testaments are central to the lessons with emphasis on the life and teachings of Jesus. In addition, children learn about the Episcopal Church and its practices, as well as the application of principles and practices of Christian living and its importance in fostering a growing faith.” Youth classes will continue in the *Journey to Adulthood* program levels appropriate to each age group.

As parents, we are called to set the model of regular attendance for our children and to participate in their faith formation. If you are not called to be a teacher, consider being a substitute and/or helping with Children's Chapel, in the nursery, or with the younger ones during coffee hour. Children see where we place our values by what we do!

**Children's Chapel** is an option for young parishioners **ages 3 through 7** during the first portion of the 10:30 am service. It has a very simple “child-sized” liturgy with activities and games to get the wiggles out before joining parents in the Sanctuary at the Peace. A rotating team of parent leaders offers this ministry. High school age youth are encouraged to volunteer to help the Chapel leaders. There is no registration. Children are invited to participate every Sunday, or from time to time as their parents choose.

The service is specifically designed for young children. Each week, a crucifer and an acolyte are selected from the assembled group, and, under the guidance of the chapel leader, have those roles for the day. Two additional children serve as ushers, collecting the offering. (A nickel or dime is suggested!) In an interactive format, the children learn some of the forms of worship used in the Sanctuary service while enjoying a story presentation, prayers, activities, and songs that are age-appropriate and correspond to the lectionary. Following the service, they are brought to join their parents in the Sanctuary at the Peace. Parents, be sure to signal your children as they enter from the Sacristy so they can be easily guided to your pew.

Parental help is needed in several ways. If you plan for your child to worship in Children's Chapel on a particular Sunday, please remember to share that information with him or her and the Sunday School teacher. Children can't always remember what the plan of the day might be and can get anxious if they aren't sure

when to expect to see a parent again. Children enjoy making an offering when the miniature alms basin is passed, so please remember that coin. Parents are welcome to sit in on the service. We would love to have an extra pair of hands any time to help the Chapel leaders!

#### The Nursery

Our nursery is staffed by a rotating team of parents and is open from 10:15 am through the end of the 10:30 am service. The nursery is found just off the Commons near the classrooms. We do invite children age 2½, whose parents deem them ready, to join the youngest Sunday School class next door to the nursery.

#### For Parents

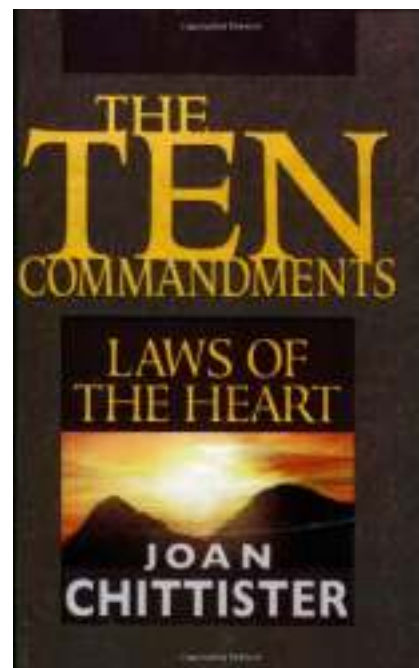

Enjoy everything you could want in an oasis (except for the camels) – comfortable chairs, a Keurig machine, good lighting and quiet.

### Adult Forum for Fall

Using the same program format as last year's, from the organization Faith and Reason, we will explore the Ten Commandments in Adult Forum sessions.

"In this series, Joan Chittister, OSB, asks the question, "What are the Ten commandments and what do they mean to us now in a world where Jew, Christian, and Muslim all claim to embrace Moses and the Tablets of Sinai as the foundation of our law, however many other laws we all add to them?" Sr. Joan invites us to think deeply about the moral fibers of our society. She presents the idea that the Ten Commandments are an adventure in human growth and that we are not so much convicted by them as we are transformed by them. "What does it mean to us, to the world, to preserve the Ten Commandments as the bedrock of our civilization?" In this series, Sr. Joan offers an honest and refreshing approach to the Ten Commandments unlike anything present today. "

As we did last fall, each Sunday will begin with a ten minute DVD presentation, followed by a discussion facilitated by David Bicking, Tom Ellington, Webster Gibson or Michael Mohn. Please grab a cup of coffee and join us in the Tilford Room at 9:30 am on Sunday mornings.

### Panda Pantry

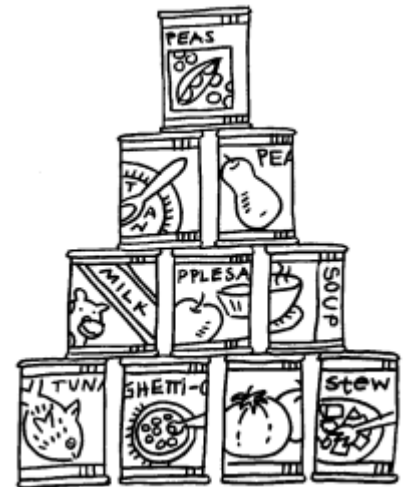
The Christ Church outreach program which began last year as the Backpack Ministry is starting a new school year of providing a weekend food program for children who attend Frederick Douglass Elementary School in Winchester. Because the school's mascot is the panda bear, we've renamed the program "Panda Pantry." With assistance from the Outreach Committee, several other groups within Christ Church, and a grant from the Rotary Club, we will be able to provide breakfast, lunch, snack, and dinner for 50 children who participate in the school lunch program during the week, but don't have resources for food on weekends. These children have been selected by the school's guidance counselor and we began delivering food to them on Thursday, August 14th. Over 60 parishioners have volunteered to help procure, pack, and deliver the food to the school for distribution to the students on Fridays throughout the school year. We know from feedback through the staff and teachers at the school that the students REALLY need and appreciate the food. We have gotten word that with the addition of one more school in Winchester this year, every elementary school now has such a program for their students and we feel truly blessed to be able to participate in this outreach ministry to God's children! Thanks to everyone who has volunteered or contributed so far, and to those who we know will continue to support this vital ministry. ### CCAP Collection Resumes in September

## Properties Committee News

The Properties Committee wants you to know that they will soon be installing new signage for Christ Church parking spaces. The parking lot at the Baden Center will have a sign restricting parking to Christ Church visitors. The signs will include notice that violators will be towed.

Behind the Smith Building, there are two spaces marked for the clergy. These spots are **always** for the clergy—even after-hours. Do not park in them! The next spot east is for our neighbor at 110 W. Boscawen St. Do not park it in either. The next two spots east are marked for Christ Church use and are used by staff and visitors to the office. To the west of the clergy spaces, there is a handicap space and then one more spot marked for Christ Church staff.

Please do not park in the alley next to the Parish Hall and do not block the alley behind the church for access to Washington Street.

## Course Offered

### CENTER FOR LIFE-LONG LEARNING ANNOUNCES “THE ILLUMINATIONS IN ART AND MUSIC OF HILDEGARD VON BINGEN, MEDIEVAL MYSTIC (1098-1179)”



Hildegard von Bingen was the Abbess for thirty years at the influential Benedictine Monastery for women in the Rhineland Valley during the 12<sup>th</sup> century. Abbess Hildegard was a formidable woman artist, poet, musician and theologian, as well as monastic administrator. She wrote seventy poems and nine books with the help of her Scribe Volmar on medicine, science, physiology and theology. She wrote a play set to music in addition to seventy-two songs. Historians have over 100 letters that she wrote to emperors and popes, archbishops, bishops and the nobility. She preached in Cathedrals and taught in churches and founded religious houses.

At the age of 42, she began to have spiritual visions that she recorded in thirty-six paintings which she called “Illuminations,” one of which is pictured in the side painting.

This CLL study, sponsored by Shenandoah University, will meet once a week for five Monday evenings to study the life, art and music of Hildegard of Bingen. The class will also consider the spirituality of creating circular, spherical, or egg-shaped formations called Mandalas for healing power and self-awareness.

The class will meet from 6:30-8:30 pm on the last Monday of September and the four Mondays in October, the classroom at SU yet to be decided.

Participants will need two books for this study. The first is a historical novel of the life of Hildegard by Mary Sharratt entitled: *Illuminations: a Novel of Hildegard von Bingen* published by Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, 2012. The second book by Matthew Fox is a study of 24 of Hildegard’s vision paintings published by Bear and Company, second edition 2002. The title of the book is: *Illuminations of Hildegard of Bingen*. You will find both books on Amazon.com.

*Your teacher is Diedra Kriewald, Ph.D., D.D. who is Professor Emerita after teaching at Wesley Theological Seminary for thirty years. Dr. Kriewald continues to teach as an Adjunct Professor in the Department of Religion and Philosophy at Shenandoah University. ### Parish Nurse Musings

This month, I would like to focus on adult immunizations. We have a lot of information about children's immunizations, but we forget that vaccines aren't just for kids. You should get an update on Tetanus and Diphtheria, Td, every ten years. Because Pertussis is raising its ugly head again, we need to get a Tdap which includes all three. MMR (which is measles, mumps, and rubella) is for adults born 1957 or later without documentation of being vaccinated or those vaccinated before 1968 when the measles vaccine was the inactivated version, which was later withdrawn.

Now, let us look at newer vaccines for adults. Zoster wards off shingles. This virus is in your system if you had chickenpox. The vaccine is called Zostavax. Pneumococcal wards off pneumonia or meningitis caused by a bacteria. Varicella wards off chickenpox. The vaccine is called Varivax. If you don't know which vaccines you had, see if you can get a copy of your vaccination history. Former employees may have a copy or the state's health department. Your doctor can opt for blood tests to see about your immunity. Now, remember to keep your children's vaccination records to give them when they are adults. Stay healthy! See you next month!
