Rector's Message

Dear People of Christ Church,

When I returned to the office from sabbatical, someone asked me how I was doing getting back into routine. It feels a little bit like the organ restoration project to me. When you look up at the organ right now, the wooden case is there, all spruced up, waiting for the return and fine-tuning of the interior parts that make the organ what it is. In a similar way, I am physically here and ready to get back into the routine of parish life, but my "interior," my mind, is still adjusting from traveling, school, construction projects and the culture of the Dominican Republic. Like the organ, it's a bit of a process to return from this time of refreshment to solid working order!

My hunch is some of you have this same feeling with summer quickly ending, school starting earlier, shifting back into the fall routine. And while sometimes the routines are comfortable, there are always some disruptions to challenge us! Again, the organ. The process of re-installation will take much of September to accomplish. As we look to re-dedicate the organ and have concerts to celebrate our music and organ programs this fall, the organ will continue to be "in the process" of being tuned or "voiced" by the organ company. We will still be learning about the care and construction of organs as we move through this process in coming weeks.

A joyful "disruption" from our normal Sundays will be when the Rt. Rev. Susan Goff will be with us on Sunday, September 20, at the 10:30 am service. Visitations have been earlier in our program year recently simply because of the challenge of scheduling three bishops

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From the Assistant Rector

Dear Friends in Christ,

Recently, the topics of calling, discernment, and ministry have been popping up all around me. This has led to many wonderful conversations about the experiences we have all had. The sense of feeling called to try something new, to enter a time of reflection and discernment, and to claim who we are and what it means for us to be disciples. These conversations have been opportunities to remember that through baptism we are all issued the call to be ministers. I often use the answer to the question, "What is the ministry of the laity (all of us)?" from the Catechism found on page 855 in the Book of Common Prayer as a way to frame these conversations:

The ministry of lay (all) persons is to represent Christ and his Church; to bear witness to him wherever they may be; and, according to the gifts given them, to carry on Christ's work of reconciliation in the world; and to take their place in the life, worship, and governance of the Church.

As the church, we live out our calling as disciples in community with one another. We pray together, we learn together, and we work together to promote justice, peace, and love in a broken world. The life of faith is not a sedentary activity. It is not passive. We do not just sit idly by watching God at work in the world. That would be boring and so uneventful! Thanks be to God that instead of this picture of faith, we are called to be disciples of The Way actively engaging our faith as we learn, serve, and grow.

One particular image of this active life of faith that has wormed it's way into my heart and mind and has served as a constant reminder to me of God's call to the church is one I saw last summer. The Rev. Becca Stevens projected an image of da Vinci's *The Last Supper* as she spoke these words: "If the church is not a movement, it becomes a still life, beautiful to look at but with no effect." We are a movement. We are a people called to love unconditionally from the center of our very being and that means we can't just sit back and hope someone else says, "Yes!" We each have our place to take in this movement of love.

We have a tendency, when we hear the call or are invited to participate in the life of the church, to first see our limitations before imagining the possibilities. Living faithfully as disciples of our Lord is a daily practice of making the deep choice to live our lives based in gratitude, abundance ("there is enough"), and in appreciation for the gifts God has given us to answer our call.

Be encouraged on your path of discipleship and live lives of proclamation, witness and service. God makes use of everything we offer. So be willing, be creative, be generous, and answer the call!



If someone were to ask you, you may have a good idea of who/what a bishop is, but raise your hand if you thought to consult our Catechism for an official answer or to refresh your memory of Sunday School days-of-yore? What? You say you didn't *know* we have a Catechism to consult – and that it's in the back of our Book of Common Prayer? Yes, friends, *An Outline of the Faith*, commonly called the Catechism, starts on page 845, with the rubrics (a.k.a. – special instructions) in italics on the preceding page.

In case your BCP isn't handy, here is a question on page 855, from the section entitled, The Ministry:

Q. What is the ministry of a bishop?

A. The ministry of a bishop is to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as apostle, chief priest, and pastor of a diocese; to guard the faith, unity, and discipline of the whole Church; to proclaim the Word of God; to act in Christ's name for the reconciliation of the world and the building up of the Church; and to ordain others to continue Christ's ministry.

How confident do you feel about your answer to the question: What is Confirmation? Page 860 instructs us: Confirmation is the rite in which we express a mature commitment to Christ, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop.

And now, because all good things come in three, we'll leave you with a third and final Catechismic Q & A. What is required of those to be confirmed? It is required of those to be confirmed that they have been baptized, are sufficiently instructed in the Christian Faith, are penitent for their sins, and are ready to affirm their confession of Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord.

All adults of the parish are invited to help the teachers in our classrooms up through grade 2 on Sunday mornings. All that is required is your presence and helping hands!



Women's Bible Study

Both groups will read Brian D. McLaren's book, *We Make the Road by Walking: A Year-Long Quest for Spiritual Formation, Reorientation, and Activation* (available at local bookstores or Amazon). McLaren is an author, speaker, activist, and public theologian. He is a popular conference speaker and a frequent guest lecturer for denominational and ecumenical leadership gatherings in the U.S. and internationally, and is Theologian-in-Residence at Life in the Trinity Ministry. From the Finance Committee

2015 Budget & Actual: Same story as previous months...

The brickwork has been completed at a total cost of \$10,905* that has been temporarily charged to the Property/Maintenance operating account. The Finance Committee will move this Capital Expense charge and pay it out of a proper investment account after the committee has finished work on reviewing the investment accounts this summer.

Due to some revenues that have been received early and total expenses being very close to plan – instead of being in the negative by about \$24,000,we are in the negative by about \$20,500 before any brickwork adjustments. If the brickwork charge were moved to a capital expense account, we would be about \$9,600 in the negative. As reported in the detail table below, after the brickwork adjustment, we are ahead of budget by about \$14,800.

From the Properties Committee

Rest assured, the Properties Committee is always busy initiating one of the following: re-painting, re-pointing, re-enforcing, or re-prioritizing based on which project is in most need of attention in our buildings and grounds!

We are happy to report that our Bell Tower re-painting has been completed by Mike Cook Painters. They put in 225 man-hours over the past several months. Look up and you'll see a nice, bright white heavy-duty commercial paint emphasizing all the levels up to our beautiful spire.

A new surge protector was installed in the Smith Building over the summer to protect our investment in all of our technology equipment and the elevator. So far, so good. We have had no events adversely affecting anything electronic to date. We are currently investigating, with an electrician, installing new surge protectors in the main church building and the Tilford Room.

We are also investigating a new telephone system for the Church Office to replace the old system.

Several of our committee members worked hard over the past year physically inspecting each of our buildings, assessing their needs, both short-term and long-term, and creating a prioritized list. Another committee is now reviewing that list and working with the Finance Committee to determine what we can actually do to make a dent in these projects.
